








Azmyl Yunor is no stranger to the School of Arts Press. In past months, SOAP had featured the senior lecturer in the Department of Film and Performance Art for his various online activities ever since Malaysia was put into MCO. Azmyl have been in full force throughout the month of May. He has launched an EP titled "PKP", acronym for Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan (In English: Movement Control Order), done music collaborations for a song titled "Kurang Gaji" and was interviewed on BFM s "A Bit of Culture" Podcast.


Azmyl launched "PKP" on the 9th of May, a video EP inspired by the COVID-19 pandemic. These collections of seven songs are a set of improvised lo-fi music that he has posted online throughout the MCO period. To listen to his new video EP, click here!

On May 11th, Kinovisuals, an independent production house invited various artists across the indie music scene to collaborate and jam to Azmyl's cover of "Makan Gaji" (In English: Wage Earner) as a commemoration to the MCO situation that Malaysians are in. Azmyl was joined by 24 other artists for vocals as well as instrumentals. The song title was changed to "Kurang Gaji" (Insufficient Wage), a musical social commentary on the issue of wage gaps and debt that are being working-class experienced amongst the society. "Kurana Gaji" has received more than 600 views on Youtube as well as close to 70 thousand views on Facebook and can be viewed here!



On 22nd May, Azmyl also made an appearance in BFM's "A Bit of Culture" Podcast. The episode is titled "Adapting Dystopian Safety" and was hosted by Kam Raslan, alongside Bernice Chauly. They discussed questions such as "Are we safe to go out yet?", their experiences while in quarantine and what was it like for them to adapt to the new normal. Azmyl, as an educator also touched on the topic of pastoral care for students beyond lecturing and grading.

Dr. Andrew Filmer hosting the SOA Online Lecture Series with Prof. Donald Maurice

For the SOA Online Lecture Series this month, Dr. Andrew Film invited Prof. Donald Maurice from Victoria University of Wellington, New Zealand to share about the viola d'amore, performing chamber music and works by Béla Bartók with SOA music students over Zoom. The onehour session was also streamed live on SOA Facebook page from 12 pm to 1 pm on 20th May.

After some self-introduction, Prof. Maurice explained and demonstrated on his viola d'amore which he has devoted all of his energy to since 2015. The viola d'amore is a 7- or 6-stringed musical instrument and shares many similar features to the viol family. It has a flat back and an intricately carved head at the top of the peg box which is lacking in some violins. Prof. Maurice commissioned a copy of an old version of viola d'amore.

He also discussed his collaborative works internationally and his albums recordings such as works by Bach, Paganini, de Fossa, Kimber, Vivaldi, Graupner, and NZ composers Michael Williams and David Hamilton. In the week preceding the 45th International Viola Congress, he filmed a music video in Poland on concertos by Graupner featuring the viola d'amore.

At the end of the lecture, some students raised intriguing questions about his special instrument. They were also curious about how and why Prof. Maurice decided to major in the viola d'amore. The lecture provided participants with a wonderful chance to learn from a very skillful violist, have a better understanding of the viola d'amore in particular, and also classical music in general.



There lies an idyllic fishing village off the Selangor coast. It is reachable by 30 minutes' boat ride from Port Klang. I have been to this place 20 years ago but my memory of it has faded over time. Two years ago, I rediscovered this place when I brought my non-Malaysian friend there for a visit. Without much expectation other than knowing it is a fishing village located on a mangrove island, I found, to my great surprise, that this place has abandoned. Since then, I decided to do something for this village.

The website www.designforgood.my presents the project that I have started from my teaching of Sustainable Design subject. It has since been upgraded as an internal-grant research project which led to cross-disciplinary and cross-sector collaboration with a few Selangor Exco offices, Kampung Sungai Lima Village Community Management Council as well as Malaysian Nature Society and School of Hospitality from Sunway University. It is a long-term social innovation project that aims at the sustainable development of the village.

On the website, we present the details of the project, including some facts about the village, its culture, the challenges it faces, and potential solutions to its problems. On-going activities will also be posted. By persistently updating on this website, we are not only



sharing our research findings with the public but, more importantly, we are hoping for future collaboration with researchers and volunteers who share the same vision as us. We want to bring our knowledge and expertise together to make a real impact to the community and its environment.

Rachel Goh Pei Shvuan is a Year 3 Communication student who served as a committee member in Sunway Ambassador Leadership (SALT) for two years. Founded in 2015, SALT never failed to provide a jam-packed experience for high schoolers to get a taste of activities on leadership skills in a fun-filled environment. She first started as a participant in Form progressively grow her experience into an exemplary leader for her juniors. Are you ready to take a ride through Rachel's journey into SALT?

SALT piqued her interest even before entering Sunway college and the influence felt even greater when Mr Adrian, the Assistant Manager of Marketing Department and Advisor of SALT closely kept in touch after their first encounter at her secondary school. After being accepted as a committee member, it started out rough as Rachel admitted that "She was being blur,

had no sense of sensibility and needed the team to lead her through many tasks". Nevertheless, this didn't stop her from going above and beyond in becoming the Head of PR even though she was new to the team. Rachel adapted quickly within the next few months with the guidance of her fellow partner. The push that made her do her very best was to "complete every task given and making sure that it doesn't go overdue". If this happens, chaos will befall on the team and create a snowball effect thereafter.

It wasn't surprising that she had a strong mindset to gain new experiences which landed her different positions for two consecutive years. As Head of PR, it was all about maintaining close connection with the high schoolers, managing social media pages and stressing the purpose of why SALT events happen in the first place.

Rachel was grinning ear to ear when she mentioned "During SPM season, her team prepared study kits that had a miniature sized calendar for the students to enjoy". However, many people wrongly assumed that the content team had it easy with the planning of activities but in reality, every activity was created from scratch according to objectives beforehand. She stressed that "both roles were challenging in their own ways". The satisfaction of handling a full-blown event other than her usual academic syllabus still blows her mind as "These experiences made her grow, matured and have a sense of sensibility as a person"



This advice not only applies to SALT but for any clubs and societies where it's best to fully understand one's sole purpose of joining these extracurricular activities. There can be a whole list of reasons such as making new friends, becoming an emcee, becoming a game master etc but only you can be certain of what your true intentions are. Rachel couldn't stress it more saying that "teamwork should be a top priority and there shouldn't be any time for slacking when it will heavily affect the flow of work with your team". Being an overachiever, she makes that term look like a piece of cake especially juggling in between extracurricular activities and studies. She always keeps a small diary to jot down every plan two months in advance to be fully prepared with a reminder to consistently be "disciplined with your time management".

As for studies, she is truly blessed to have the gift of studying a week before the exams so it saves her a lot of time. Tell me, who wouldn't wish to have this capability? Rachel ended with a good note saying "having good teammates to rely on will help you a long way in times of need so choose them wisely."

She wishes for her juniors to "take on the challenge" and to "continue SALT's legacy in creating more responsible leaders". Who knows, you might be the next person to inspire the next batch of juniors that would love to follow in your footsteps. This is the kind of challenge and experience that will make you grow as a person while pushing past your limits to tick off achievements that you didn't know you are capable of.
