unway Education Group launched #TheLastStraw campaign recently to drive awareness for the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDGs). Students and staff worked with Sunway campus vendors to voice their support for this initiative and protect the world's oceans from plastic pollution as part of the Sunway Education Group Smart Sustainable Campus Committee's efforts. Additional water dispensers have been placed on campus grounds.

Plastic containers, bottles, cups, cutlery, and straws are such indispensable part of modern life that plastic is now the number one source of pollution in our oceans. The urgency to reduce this unsustainable dynamic cannot be overstated as the likelihood of having more plastic than fish in the ocean is becoming a reality.

At the launch of the campaign, Acting Ambassador of the Sunway Education Group Smart Sustainable Campus Committee, Senior Executive Director of Sunway Education Group and Sunway University Dr Elizabeth Lee encouraged all to do their bit to reduce ocean litter through simple gestures like saying NO to plastic straws, switching to metal or biodegradable straws, or using your own mugs or reusable tumblers.

Aquaria KLCC General Manager Daryl Foong explained the importance of marine conservation and how #The LastStraw campaign is about initiating positive change with a simple act of saying NO to all single use plastics.

# MONICA FOONG SUI OI HAVING THE HEART TO CARE

Monica Foong, Head of Nursing at the School of Healthcare and Medical Sciences, believes one must have the heart to care in this profession

oong was going through curtain colours with a contractor on the phone when I arrived to see her for our appointment. The department is in the midst of completing a new mock operating theatre and a new mock intensive care unit to expand its Post Basic programmes. She decided on sky blue coloured curtains before switching off her smartphone to begin our interview.

"I want to have more specialised courses and programmes," Foong said. "That's where the ICU and OT will come in." Besides training nurses with specialisations, Foong is also working to increase her department's capacity to offer the Diploma in Nursing, which is the first programme launched by Sunway University in 2008.

Sunway University works very closely with Sunway Medical Centre which offers more than 100 scholarships a year to deserving students to pursue the Diploma in Nursing. The University currently accepts up to 60 students per year, but Foong is working with the Ministry of Education to double this.

"In order to do that, we must have the staffing, lab resources, and clinical placements, because nursing is not only training in simulated wards," Foong said. "You must have the real environment for students."

# **PATH TO NURSING**

Foong hails from the small town of Batu Gajah, where she attended the local convent school. Her father was a winchman and mother was a housewife.

"My paternal grandmother never believed in education," said Foong, who is the eldest among eight siblings. "Even though we come from a very poor background, thankfully my father never believed that." How Foong embarked on a career in nursing is a combination of childhood ambition, circumstances and family influences. She also has extended family members working in various capacities in the healthcare profession, including medicine, pharmacy, midwifery and nursing. "So growing up, I fell in love with the idea of being a nurse and I love to read books related to healthcare, doctors and nurses," Foong said.

Foong was trained at Assunta Hospital, where she said she learnt to be a caring and compassionate person. "Practically every nursing school now is headed by an Assuntarian," Foong said. "At Sunway Medical Centre, many of their nurses in management positions are also Assuntarians." Foong's mission is to emulate her alma mater's legendary reputation, where the mere mention of Sunway University will land its students a nursing job anywhere they go.

In the mid-1980s, having been registered with the United Kingdom Central Council for Nursing and Midwifery (UKCC) and more than five years of working experience under her belt, she went to the UK with her husband, who was studying for a MBA, to work as a registered nurse and pursue her studies in Midwifery. Upon her return to Malaysia, Foong worked at various private hospitals, gaining management experience while getting exposure to all facets of the nursing profession.

Foong came to the School of Healthcare and Medical Sciences at the recommendation of Sunway Medical Centre Managing Director Mr Lau Beng Long. "There are quite a few things we can do to make the school even better and bring nursing to a different direction," Foong said. Prior to her current posting, she was a talent recruiter at Sunway Medical Centre.





### **COMING TO WORK AT SUNWAY UNIVERSITY**

As head of department, Foong balances administrative duties with the academic demands of her role, which includes everything from attending staff meetings and getting programme accreditations to evaluating clinical instructors and developing research collaborations.

A typical day for Foong begins at 8:30am with the daily ritual of corporate employment - going through messages. "From there on, it never seems to stop," said Foong, who wears a fitbit and achieves her 10,000 steps every day by walking to work. "It takes 10 minutes each way, so the car is only for weekends," Foong said. "It's very, very underutilised."

Sunway Medical Centre is commencing a huge expansion plan in the coming years, with five to six hospitals in the pipeline. This includes facilities at Sunway Velocity Cheras, Kota Damansara, Tambun, Ipoh, Penang and Iskandar City, Johor (which will be twice the size of Sunway City). "As far as Sunway Healthcare Group is concerned, the sky's the limit. In order to support that, nurses need to be well trained.

At the moment, the nursing school is training nurses to meet the needs of the healthcare sector and Sunway Medical Centre, which offers full scholarships for qualified candidates. 90 percent of student nurses at Sunway University had their education sponsored by Sunway Medical Centre. Going forward, Foong wants the department to also offer programmes at the degree and masters levels. "I want Sunway University to be known as the premier training provider for healthcare education and training recognised both locally and internationally."

Throughout our conversation, Foong repeatedly emphasised the great demand for nurses globally. A nurse with five years of working experience, armed with a degree and specialised training, can confidently walk across the causeway. Singapore is ever ready to poach our best and brightest, and offer them jobs.

The Middle East is another place Foong cites young nurses can easily command five-figure salaries. Even though some stay back for personal reasons or family commitments, Foong concedes that the attrition rate is an issue and local hospitals have to work harder to retain talents. One other challenge in the nursing profession is it has been seen as being predominantly female. According to Foong, parents have not been supportive of sons venturing into the nursing profession in the past, but this is slowly changing, because the opportunities for career advancement is so great and diverse. The current cohort of 59 nursing students in the diploma programme includes eight male students.

# A NURSE AND A TEACHER

Foong treks and camps to relax, but admits that she hasn't done much of both with her husband since taking on this role. "We used to go out to Kuala Kubu Bharu and camp there with our children when they were much younger," said Foong, who had also trekked the Jomsom and Annapurna trails in Nepal. "Each time we go, we would spend about two weeks."

Even though her son tells her that working late every day is taxing on her health, retirement is not on Foong's horizon anytime soon. "I have colleagues who are in their 70s, and they can go on and on, for as long as you don't lose your marbles."

"It has always been my dream to be a nurse, a teacher, or a nurse and teacher," Foong said. "I'm lucky and blessed in the sense that I get to do both."

"To be able to share in the joy of couples bringing a life to this world, or hold somebody's hand and say a last farewell before he or she goes, you become a friend to the family," said Foong, who is also a registered midwife in Malaysia. "It is not just a job, and if I am given a second chance, I'll still be a nurse."

# WHAT'S WRONG WITH K-DRAMAS

he Korean wave emerged during the late 1990s. when Korean dramas were exported to Vietnam and, subsequently, China, Indonesia, Thailand, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Japan and Malaysia. Nowadays, Korean restaurants are commonplace, K-pop songs are available on most music platforms, and Sunway students can be found watching K-dramas at the foyer! So, what's wrong with K-drama?

Dr Teh Pek Yen from the School of Hospitality researched how K-drama affected tourism in South Korea since 2010 for her PhD, looking particularly to the distinct travelling patterns of Malaysians who visited Korea. In a 2017 collaboration with Dr Sean Kim, Associate Professor at Edith Cowan University, she examined the challenges female Muslim tourists face in Korea, and how K-drama is used as an educational tool to cope with these challenges.

Dr Teh embarked on a 20-day field trip to Seoul, where she conducted interviews with 30 female Muslim tourists from Malaysia. She travelled with some of these respondents to observe their behaviours - from making food choices and locating prayer rooms to the excitement of being at filming locations to coping with the language barrier.

Throughout the field trip, she met tour guides, local merchants and hostel owners to further understand the challenges of Muslim tourists vacationing in a non-Muslim country. The study found that K-drama does not only serve as an entertainment that attracts tourists to Korea. In fact, along the process of watching K-dramas, audiences gradually become attached to Korea.

Dr Teh and Dr Kim found that drama is an educational platform to transmit knowledge and prepare potential tourists to cope with the challenges before they travel. So, what's wrong with K-drama? Nothing! It contributes to the tourism industry as well as a person's knowledge of another country. Going forward, Dr Teh would like to continue looking at this issue from the hosts' perspective, especially on their readiness to receive Muslim tourists.

# SOUTHEAST ASIAN CONFERENCE ON CRYSTAL ENGINEERING



The second Southeast Asian Conference on Crystal Engineering (SEACCE-2) was held at Sunway University from 6 - 8 August, following the inaugural 2016 meet in Colombo. The conference brought together 200 practitioners from ASEAN including China and India to share knowledge, experience and to establish research collaborations in the general fields of coordination polymers and co-crystal technology for pharmaceutical applications. The conference provided an opportunity for participants to gain insights into the chemical, materials and pharmaceutical sciences frontiers. Students were thrilled to hear from "big names" in the region. The scientific programme evolved to crystal engineering topics in Metal-Organic Frameworks and co-crystals, fundamental and applications, and a more general crystallographic topics including weak interactions in biological systems and results of structure determinations.

# CYBERBULLYING IN SCHOOLS

Sunway, Free University Berlin and Digi collaborate to address cyberbullying by Dr Ooi Pei Boon & Dr Chan Nee Nee

unway University is working together with Free University of Berlin (FUB) and Digi to address the prevalence of cyberbullying in Malaysia. Researchers from the German university designed a cyberbullying prevention programme, Media Heroes, where initial studies have proven to be effective in reducing cyberbullying among secondary school teenagers. The programme includes group discussions, role playing, self-reflection and case studies on definitions, causes and consequences of cyberbullying.

A workshop was held in April with school counsellors from 11 secondary schools. The two-day "train the trainer" experiential workshop was designed based on the "Theory of Planned Behaviour." Twenty three secondary school counsellors were trained by Madita Elise Siddique from FUB and the Sunway University team comprising of Principal Investigator Dr Ooi Pei Boon, Associate Prof Dr Teh Phoey Lee, Lecturer Priyadharshini Ahrumugam and Associate Researcher Dr Chan Nee Nee.

This interdisciplinary project aims to reach out to 1,000 students in the Klang Valley this year. It was designed to be interactive and thought-provoking. Students are challenged to think critically and to practise empathy during interactive activities. They also learned about the legal consequences of cyberbullying.

"Research and innovation are critical for solving challenges in the educational sector", said Dr Herbert Scheithauer, Professor of Developmental Psychology and Clinical Psychology at FUB. "We are expecting a productive collaboration with colleagues from

Sunway University with regards to research in cyberbullying, cultural adaptation and implementation of the preventive intervention program Media Heroes in Malaysian schools."

"Digi has been championing internet safety for the past seven years and we have seen how cyberbullying evolves over time adapting to the advancements in technology", said Philip Ling, Head of Sustainability, Digi Telecommunications Sdn Bhd. "The partnership with Sunway University is timely as together we seek to unpack the complexities behind cyberbullying."

"With the training given, I am more equipped to guide my students to understand cyberbullying. With the awareness of cyberbullying, it empowers students to identify if ever they are in such a situation and to take necessary actions. The school plans to include cyberbullying awareness in the programmes organised by the counselling unit and raise the issue of cyberbullying in meetings to create more awareness among teachers", said Tan Su Ern, counsellor at SMK Tropicana.

"The seminar presented on cyberbullying is incredibly important. It is obvious that Sunway and FUB really care about this topic and want to spread the word about how to prevent cyberbullying and to help us on research-based best practices to be shared with our IISM(S)-Gombak students and other Malaysian students", said Abd Fatah Salehuddin, counsellor at International Islamic School Malaysia.

# SUNWAY UNIVERSITY HOSTS BILL GALLAGHER YOUNG CHEFS

Dr Elizabeth Lee Senior Executive Director ne hundred participants selected across the globe for the Bill Gallagher Young Chefs Forum gathered at Sunway University to immerse themselves in the challenges of feeding a hungry world. Recognised by the Worldchefs Education Committee for quality of culinary education, Sunway University capitalised on the forum as a platform to work towards ZERO HUNGER, the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal (UNSDG) Number 2.

The event, organised by Sunway University's School of Hospitality under the coordination of Chef Lee Han Ying had participants exploring different cuisines and feeding the planet in a sustainable manner. "The idea of the meal packing came from our colleagues at Sunway Group Brand Marketing and Communications", said Chef Soon Pau Voon, Teaching Fellow at Sunway University's School of Hospitality, who was also appointed the Vice President of Special Projects for Professional Culinaire Association (PCA) of Malaysia, the host nation's association for the 38th Worldchefs Congress 2018.

"Participants from the Bill Gallagher Young Chefs Forum were invited to Sunway University for the meal packing event and we decided to incorporate a Malay Heritage Cuisine Cooking Class for international participants to experience our local cooking techniques, food ingredients, taste and flavours", Chef Soon said.

"We are delighted to have all of you here at our Sunway campus today and hope that you will have a fruitful experience with us", said Vice-Chancellor of Sunway University Professor Graeme Wilkinson in his welcome address. "Aside from learning to cook some of our Malay cuisine, and also learn a little bit about the culture, I hope you will come to understand the importance and the need of giving back to society."

An exciting programme designed for young chefs under 25 years of age, the Bill Gallagher Young Chefs Forum provides talented chefs an opportunity to build their network and learn how to further develop their culinary skills inside and outside the kitchen. The group of young chefs had the opportunity to learn how to serve Asia on a Plate through the Malay Heritage Cooking Class conducted by four chefs from Sunway University's School of Hospitality.

The four chefs comprising Chef Patrick Siau Chi Yin, Chef Nur Amirah Haji Mazlan, Chef Yee Suet Rene and Chef Ng Wan Che introduced the culture and cooking traditions of Malay Heritage Cuisine by demonstrating how to prepare dishes like Nasi Kerabu, Ulam, Keropok Ikan, Rendang Kambing, Kuih Ketayap and Ondeh-Ondeh. Twenty diploma students from the School of Hospitality assisted the four chefs by preparing the necessary ingredients and interacting with the Bill Gallagher Young Chefs during the Malay Heritage Cooking Class.

Having taken a leading role in advancing the 17 UNSDGs through the establishment of the Jeffrey Sachs Center on Sustainable Development in Sunway University in December 2016, this year's Bill Gallagher Young Chefs satellite event was another occasion for Sunway University to push forward UNSDG number 2, ZERO HUNGER.

With the assistance of 250 Sunway University School of Hospitality students, the 100 young chefs packed a total of 100,000 dehydrated meals for the most impoverished communities in Cambodia. Comprising rice, soy, vegetables, permitted flavouring and 21 essential vitamins and minerals which are highly nutritious, each pre-packed meal provided by Rise Against Hunger Malaysia can serve six individuals.

On hand to provide their support for the meal packing event were Mr Tiki Keh, President of Rise Against Hunger Malaysia and Ms Jane Poh, Senior General Manager of Group Brand Marketing and Communications, Sunway Group.

# RESEARCH ON ASEAN HIGHER EDUCATION POLICY



Atherton Graeme Professor Glenda Crosling from the Centre for Higher Education Research (CHER) at Sunway University, and Associate Professor Munir Shuib of the National Higher Education Research Institute (IPPTN) at Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) recently concluded their research into 'The Shape of Global Higher Education Policy: Understanding the ASEAN region'. The research was funded by the British Council. They were ably assisted in the project by research consultant Siti Norbaya Binti Azizan.

The research looked into ASEAN higher education, the higher education policy in ten ASEAN countries, and how it supports international engagement. The three researchers bring together the emerging profile of CHER and Sunway University and the vast experience of IPPTN, and its work connecting ASEAN higher education with the global agenda.

Dr Graeme Atherton, the project coordinator has extensive experience producing higher education policy reports in the international context. He holds visiting professorships at three different universities including Sunway University where he is an Adjunct Professor of CHER.

Professor Glenda Crosling is Head of CHER and Chair of a Malaysian Qualifications Agency (MQA) expert panel. As Chair of the MQA panel, she has led the team which produced national quality assurance guidelines for Malaysia. She is a Member of the Global Higher Education Network which is co-ordinated through Universiti Sains Malaysia.

Associate Professor Munir Shuib has been serving as the Deputy Director at IPPTN since 2013, and as IPPTN's Associate Research Fellow since 2001. He has participated and led various policy oriented research in higher education including graduate unemployment, leadership, assessment, academic profession, and research development in Malaysia as well as in ASEAN countries. He also sits on the Malaysia Global Reach Committee (Community Cluster), under the Ministry of Higher Education Malaysia.

Dr Graeme Atherton, Professor Glenda Crosling, Associate Professor Munir Shuib and Siti Norbaya Binti Azizan recently presented the report and collaborative outcome of their investigation and analysis at 'The Going Global' conference held in Kuala Lumpur convened by the British Council. The findings indicate that the ASEAN countries investigated well motivated to develop internationalisation in their higher education systems, and that it can be propelled through academic capacity building and further collaboration across the region on quality assurance. Both of these initiatives are underpinned by data driven research as the basis for future policy developments.

Professor Crosling commented that the outcomes of the project present a strong view of Malaysia in terms of higher education internationalisation, when compared with the other ASEAN countries in the study. The findings indicate that in the areas of internationalisation investigated, efforts are achieving Malaysia's success. Malaysia is well placed to take a strong role in higher education internationalisation in the ASEAN reaion. Sunway University and CHER are keen to build on the deep understandings of internationalisation at the national and ASEAN levels developed through the project, and are keen to extend it by way of data collection, analysis and dissemination, order to further Malaysia's contribution in this area.

In their research, the team took a mixed methodological approach, engaged with country experts and consulted with representatives of the British Council. They also used the British Council Global Gauge, an interactive online tool made up of 37 qualitative indicators. The research is built on two previous reports produced by the British Council in the Shape of Global Higher Education series.

The research concentrated on three areas: Openness - government-level commitment to internationalisation; environment enabling international mobility of students, researchers, academic programmes and university research; Quality assurance and recognition - a regulatory environment to facilitate the international mobility of students, education providers and academic programmes; and Access and sustainability - promoting student or academic mobility and international research collaboration; consideration of possible unintended consequences of internationalisation.

The Centre for Higher Education Research (CHER) set up in 2015 has organised a series of high level conferences and seminars looking at key areas of higher education (HE) in the ASEAN region during the last 2 years. The Centre launched a global conference on HE access and equity described in 2017 and since then has been developing its portfolio of work in Malaysia, ASEAN countries and beyond. B

# 4TH ISM INTERNATIONAL STATISTICAL CONFERENCE

n collaboration with Institut Statistik Malaysia (ISM), Sunway University School of Mathematical Sciences is proud to play host to the 4th ISM International Statistical Conference (ISM-IV) over a 2-day period from 1 August 2018. There were 50 presenters at this international forum and ISM-IV acted as a platform for both academics and professionals from various industries to gain a better grasp of the role statistics has to play in advancing science and innovation.

Packed with useful information on applied, computational and circular statistics, mathematical modelling plus applications of statistics to the insurance industry and the use of statistics in monitoring sustainable development, this two-day conference had three keynote sessions and six parallel sessions chaired and conducted by researchers and academia from Australia, Bahrain, Bangladesh, India, Iran, Japan, Malaysia, Singapore and the US.

"There is no denying that mathematicians and statisticians play an important role to help unlock the governing patterns and behaviour of the continuous supply of data and information captured throughout the entire history of our existence and in the process helped us realise that there is so much we actually do not know," said Professor Ho Chee Kit, Chairman of ISM-IV and Dean, School of Mathematical Sciences at Sunway University. He thanked ISM, Bank Negara Malaysia and all sponsors for their support in bringing the conference to fruition.

Among the keynote speakers at the ISM-IV on August 1 were Emeritus Professor of Statistics at Macquarie University, Professor Dr Don McNeil who spoke on 'Can

Remote Sensing Data Analysis Open Machine Learning Black Boxes?' and Honorary Professor at the Institute of Mathematical Sciences, University of Malaya, Professor Dr Ong Seng Huat who shared about 'Mixture Modelling: Some Recent Developments'.

With a special focus dedicated to sustainable development on August 2, the ISM-IV shared the latest updates on the development and use of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) indicators in implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. With four featured presentations on Statistics for Sustainable Development, this was then followed by a keynote from Tan Sri Dr Jeffrey Cheah Ao, Founding Trustee, Jeffrey Cheah Foundation and Chancellor of Sunway University.

Through the establishment of Sunway's fully integrated green and smart townships throughout Malaysia, the Jeffrey Cheah Foundation (the largest education focused social enterprise), the Jeffrey Cheah Institute on Southeast Asia (the first public policy think tank in a private university) and the setting up of the Jeffrey Sachs Center on Sustainable Development in 2016 to curate on the world's best curriculum, academic and executive programmes on sustainable development, Tan Sri Dr Jeffrey Cheah AO continues to champion sustainability at the corporate, social and individual levels.

In his speech at ISM-IV, he hopes the knowledge gathered from the ISM-IV will enable the participants to help further drive the development of the 2030 Sustainable Development agenda and help advance Malaysia's transformation. B

# DESSERT SHOWCASE



econd year students of the BSc (Hons) in Culinary Management under the School of Hospitality at Sunway University presented a 'Desserts Showcase' as part of their Advanced Pastry final project. 15 students were separated into four teams and were given 14 weeks to plan, test and, present their sweet treats. They were judged based on five criteria; concept, sculpture, product, colours and flavour.

Some of the notable treats were Berry Christmas, slices of vanilla Bavarian cream with raspberry mousse, ladies finger and almond crunchy with a mirror glaze finish; Strawberry Choux Pastry, filled with layers of zesty fruit confit, crispy almond croquette, pistachio buttercream and fluffy rosewater pastry cream; Jolly Tart, tart with orange triple sec filling, mango coulis and mint gel, almonds and alcohol; and Peppermint Ganache Truffle, a dark chocolate truffle with peppermint filling.

"We had to find our own recipes, try them out and design original pieces for the showcase," said Soon Si Yin. Pang Jun Yong shared that "it was a learning experience in mass production where ingredients were prepared in advance and then customised." Chong Pei Qi said that her team brainstormed and changed their ideas a few times, taking up to 20 hours to finalise their idea for the main sculpture. It took them one week to construct the actual dessert sculpture whereas Bryan Chung Bi Ming and his team took three days to construct their chocolate sculpture.

According to Patrick Siau, Head Chef and Teaching Fellow for the School of Hospitality, this project enables students first-hand experience on product conceptualisation to marketing the product. Students get the opportunity to create their ideas while exploring business opportunities within a guided platform.

# WHAT SKILLS/KNOWLEDGE DO YOU THINK YOUNG PEOPLE NOWADAYS SHOULD DEVELOP?


They should learn to accept things that are out of their comfort zone and be willing to learn the hard way in order to excel in life. They should also try their best at tasks assigned to them instead of complaining.



In its aim to equip passionate, ambitious people from multidisciplinary backgrounds and who are concerned about the environment, the Center now offers the Master in Sustainable Development Management to empower individuals and organisations to develop innovative solutions to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals in actionable ways in their specific sectors or areas of work.

The 18-month Master in Sustainable Development Management will expose students to the scientific, technological, economic, and business understandings of the challenges to sustainable development, as well as provide them with in-depth knowledge of specific subject areas, such as climate change, urban sustainability, energy, water, infrastructure, biodiversity, land-use, waste management and corporate responsibility.

Designed for both working professionals and recent graduates, the programme will be delivered through classroom sessions; virtual tutorials and e-modules; research projects; and individual and group assignments.

For their research project, students are encouraged to do a research project on topics that address current and pressing sustainability challenges.

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
