# DR. ANDREW FILMER'S CAMBRIDGE PUBLICATION



Musical Interactions in Practice is an e-book published by The Centre for Intercultural Musicology at Churchill College, Cambridge. The title stems from a conference of the same name organised by the centre in October 2019. In fact, several authors of the e-book presented their papers which have now been expanded into chapters. One of them was Dr. Andrew, who is an Associate Professor from the Department of Film and Performing Arts, and his co-author, Dr. Chen. The two of them collaborated on an article titled "From Intersections to Crossroads: Navigating Interactions between Performers, Researchers and Composers''.

Read his experience with working on this incredible achievement below:

"My co-author, Dr. Chen Zhangyi from the National University of Singapore calls this research "collaboration on collaboration". Both of our presentations at a Cambridge University conference at the end of 2019 dealt with our musical partnerships: Zhangyi is a composer who worked with three soloists for his triple concerto, I'm a researcher and performer who worked with a New Zealand composer to produce a work that not only explores new sounds, but new technical possibilities for the viola. These presentations dealt with the musical end products, and less on the process of collaboration.

We watched each other's presentations, then shared a train ride from Cambridge to London, and through our conversation found that the collaborative process itself was quite interesting. We continued this conversation, and that's how this article came about. I'm very glad that the Centre for Intercultural Musicology at Churchill College, University of Cambridge under the leadership of Professor Valerie Ross has this article available without a paywall.

Though Zhangyi and I have known each other for over a decade, it was meeting again at this conference that sparked this collaboration – as well as another project: a virtual performance of a new composition that included some of my technical advancements for the viola, at a virtual concert for the Cambridge Festival 2021.

My takeaways from all this: one of the biggest advantages of conferences is networking, and don't underestimate the value of a conversation on a train – even if it's with an old friend." – Dr. Andrew Filmer



The <u>outcome</u>? Simply breathtaking!

We decided to ask the 3 students who emerged as winners of the challenge on their thoughts and takeaways from the experience.



"Overall, I am so thankful that I have been chosen as one of the winners. It was a really great experience being given this rare opportunity. I'd say this experience is like killing two birds with one stone. We did this design challenge as an assignment in order for us to learn and at the same time, we were also getting some exposure from the industry.

At first, I did get stuck during the initial planning of my design since at that time I was feeling unconfident and uncertain on whether I will make it till the end. But, with the help of my lecturer pushing me out of my comfort zone as well as getting words of reassurance from my friends and family, I was able to overcome the block and continue to have fun doing it. "Firstly, I would like to thank my lecturer, Mr. Arief for guiding me throughout this project and also my friends for giving me feedback and suggestions. For preparation, as usual, I went to the internet to find some ideas and I came across this architect named Alexis Dornier. He is an architect based in Bali. I felt that his works are interesting and it led to the concept that I chose, 'Modern Tropical Bali'.

Since I'm from Indonesia, I find it interesting to work with the concept and I feel more familiar and connected to what I'm working on. The interior was also inspired by the RuMa Hotel in Kuala Lumpur. The whole concept is a mixture of modern yet tropical and traditional blend together, which uses natural materials such as rattan, terrazzo, and wood with the combination of a modern wainscoting wall. Furthermore, the idea is to apply the Bali resort concept to the interior which gives the occupants a relaxing experience when they are at the resort on vacation."

"When I received the assignment on the Sunway Belfield Interior Design Challenge, my aim was just to ensure I completed the assignment on time, the challenge came second. The preparation for the project was like the many interior design assignments I have completed over the last few semesters in my course – concept development and design development. For this project, we were given the Floor Plan (Type E for Diploma students) and we took it from there to design the space after studying the floor plan.

I chose a Scandinavian design theme and incorporated the smart home living concept in it. With the hustle and bustle of a busy working life, my first thought of design was to provide the occupants with a calm living sanctuary when they return home after a long working day. My design involves calming hues of blue and green with minimalist furnishings, which is to exude a clutter-free living feeling. With smart home automation, the occupant can control devices such as the air conditioning, lighting system and entertainment system. For example, they can turn on the air conditioning and lights before reaching home and when they arrive, they will be greeted with cool air and a bright home. In a way, this design is somewhat based on the idea of my own future home - a modern, minimalistic home infused with the use of digitalisation.

The challenge in completing this project was ensuring the rendering was done well for a realistic outlook of the interior design. Winning this design challenge was very unexpected and it was a pleasant surprise. For this I would like to thank my lecturer, Mr. Ivan Yeong, whose guidance, advice and support were invaluable. Overall, it was an insightful experience to have."

Since its inception in 2016, the <u>Centre for Research Creation in Digital Media (CRCDM)</u> in the School of Arts at Sunway University, has been very passionate about preserving fragile cultural heritage and always look for ways to "re-present" digital cultural heritage to a wider Malaysian audience.

The centre team has recently published 3 articles in the <u>Journal of Virtual Creativity</u> (<u>JVC</u>) resulting from the XR and Creativity Symposium organized by the FASTLab, School of Creative Industries at the University of Newcastle in October 1-2, 2020. The JVC presents research into the transformative effects of extended reality (XR) technologies, which have great potential to generate social good in a range of contexts including creative industries, connected health and well-being, psychology, medicine, remote collaboration, digital heritage, digital humanities, education and training.

The papers from CRCDM comprise: Harold Thwaites - Heritage preservation in the postdigital era: How much information is enough?, Delas Santano, Human Esmaeili, Harold Thwaites and Shamsul Amar: Unmasking the Mah Meri mask: A digitization journey for AR and VR, and Matthew Sansom and Zi Siang See: Translating performative mediated art into virtual reality: A case study. This SCOPUS indexed publication marks the continuing collaboration of the CRCDM research team with the team at the University of Newcastle and beyond.

A new project is the establishment of the multi-partner Virtual-Augmented Reality Research Network - "Exploring human and social dynamics through virtuality." VARRN is 2020 Sunway University funded bv a research network grant of RM50K. The international network takes as its collaborative network focus, how virtual systems, information networks and digital media intersect with the experiences of human condition across the different local social and cultural settings within which our research is located. It builds onto the of sustainability, concepts the cultural imaginary, tangible, intangible, the mobilisation empowering knowledge of virtuality applications across the ASEAN region, and between the CRCDM partners.

The ASEAN/International team is composed of researchers from Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia, Indonesia, Australia, China and Ireland. The network highlights 3 key areas of research - Heritage – Health – Education, with five start-up projects underway in: Augmented Narratives, Storytelling and Soundscapes; Virtual Healthcare and Creative Ageing; Smart Heritage and Cultural Futures; Upcycling and Augmented Memory and Heritage Sustainability and Archiving. Details can be found on the network website. Upcoming events include a webinar on "Virtual and Augmented Reality Implementation for Urban Arts and Cultural Industries" and a virtual exhibition entitled "TRANSMEDIA2 – Revisiting the Virtual and the Real", to take place in December on a virtual exhibition platform and with conditions permitting in the SOA View Gallery.

TRANSMEDIA2 expands upon the synergy of arts, humanities and digital technology and will showcase the correlation between Research encourage and Creation. knowledge sharing, collaboration and content integration between creators. academics and artists. It will present new concepts, forms and ideas in the arts and humanities in Malaysia to build awareness and appreciation of research-creation across the virtual and the real.

The CRCDM team led by Prof. Thwaites continues to innovate new projects and collaborations in Malaysia and beyond.

# Mr. Lyon Laxman 23 Years of Teaching

Mr. Lyon Laxman is a senior teaching fellow with the Department of Communication here at Sunway University. On the 10th of August, he celebrated an incredible milestone – being a lecturer at Sunway for 23 years. Mr. Lyon joined the School of Information Technology & Multimedia (SITM) in 1998, which eventually turned into the School of Computer Technology (SCT) when Sunway went through the transition of becoming a college-university. It was around 2010/2011 that Mr. Lyon transferred over from the IT department in college to the communications department in university.

"If you told me 15 years ago that I would be a lecturer that teaches both IT and communication-based subjects, I would've found it very hard, if not impossible to believe."





Over the years, Mr. Lyon has experienced several high-points in his career, one of them was being the first staff member to be sent by Sunway to Lancaster University to complete his postgraduate studies. He did his masters in media production in distribution, a topic that was more practical rather than research focused.

He was also able to make many new friends at Lancaster, one of whom he collaborated with to join a competition. They had developed a game that was playable and allowed two devices to communicate via Bluetooth. They both went on to win the competition, which was the icing on the cake for Mr. Lyon who finished his masters and graduated with a distinction.

"While it was extremely difficult to be without my family for 6 months, it was an immensely rewarding experience that I will never forget. I was given the chance to be exposed to technological advancements over there that had not even been introduced within our region of Asia at that time."



Another proud moment for Mr. Lyon was when he and a group of students had launched a 24-hour radio station in 2002 called "The Pit Zone". They hosted talk shows, played music and did a variety of other programmes that had listeners tuning in locally and internationally, some even from the USA. However, once the university started expansion Mr. Lyon and his students had to eventually abandon the project, but until today it is one of his top highlights while being at Sunway.

Although no journey is complete without both highs and lows equally, Mr. Lyon continues to start each day with a fresh perspective. No matter the situation, he never has to drag himself out of bed because he loves what he does wholeheartedly. He not only enjoys sharing his knowledge and skill set, but also discussing what he has read and watched with his students. He hopes that whatever he instills in them is carried on into the further stages of their lives and careers.

"I feel happy when students are able to apply what I have taught them for their internship placements and even future jobs. It makes me feel as if I have had a part to play in the success many of them have achieved in their life thus far."

Mr. Lyon credits his students as his main motivation and says that he has learnt a lot from them over the past 23 years. He noted that the way students have interacted has significantly changed each decade, and that at times he has to check with his children if he understands certain phrases correctly or is able to use some terms appropriately. To him, this is a win-win because he is able to teach students what he knows while they are able to educate him on current events. For Mr. Lyon, it's all part of the learning process as he wants all forms of communication to be reciprocated by all parties involved. In a few years, Mr. Lyon hopes to set up a 3D exhibition that showcases the works of his students that celebrates stereoscopic vision. He aims to combine elements of IT and communications together to create an interactive experience for all the participants that are required to wear 3D glasses to view what is on display. Before he can get started on that dream, Mr. Lyon wants to first complete his PhD. He admitted that finding a single topic to research has been a challenge because he has many diverse interests and is unsure how to string them together for a structured thesis paper.

"I need to find a subject that aligns with what I love to do so that I don't feel burdened or stressed. I tell myself what I tell all my students, which is to pursue what you like so that you are able to enjoy yourself along the way."





Despite the plans he has, Mr. Lyon's priority is focused on his teaching. As an individual and as a lecturer, he wishes to continue improving his innovation & creativity when it comes to his content and teaching style.

He stated that as the semesters come and go, he realises the importance of adapting more and more, especially with the introduction of new programmes and teaching methods in the near future. Mr. Lyon also feels that he has been able to come out of his shell and considers himself more approachable now than he was 20 years ago.

"I am definitely more confident in facing larger groups of students (as many as 200 at one time) or even being one-to-one with a student. I am more confident in my abilities as a lecturer, more comfortable to speak publicly, do interviews, be part of video assignments, have articles written about me and so on." To Mr. Lyon, there is no such thing as a 'perfect career'. He has had his fair share of ups and downs, an equal balance of tough times and proud moments, but the times that he has hit a 'brick wall' have taught him how to prevent himself from colliding with it again. His time at Sunway has taught him many life lessons, just as he has taught many lessons about life to those that have come to study at Sunway.

This month's issue of Life After SOA features Graeme Tan Jie, a BA (Hons) Digital Film Production 2021 graduate. His experience during and beyond pursuing his degree has led him to evolve from filmography to becoming a full-fledged producer.

To Graeme, studying in Sunway has been "nothing short of amazing". After finishing his Diploma in Mass Communications from another institution, he was looking for a course related to production and filmmaking. After finding out that Sunway was offering the Digital Film Production course, he registered in a heartbeat. Additionally, he was also awarded a full scholarship to complete his 3-year degree here at SOA -The Chancellor's Scholarship. Initially, the scholarship included a transfer programme to Lancaster University in the UK, but unfortunately due to the pandemic, he was unable to travel there. "Ultimately, I am still really grateful for what Sunway has provided in terms of my tertiary education," he says.



Throughout his life at SOA, a particular lecturer that really stood out and challenged Graeme not just in his studies, but also how he viewed the world was none other than Mr. Azmyl. "He [Mr. Azmyl] is a phenomenal lecturer and in his class you not only learn about arts & film, but also how it affects our lives. One significant lecture I remembered vividly was when he was teaching us about punk music and also the story and period of that time — how different punk bands from all over the world performed and toured, and the story behind it. He is a really learned person and often asks thoughtprovoking questions to challenge our beliefs, and that to me was really inspiring and value adding."

Furthermore, Graeme was also part of the Sunway Student Ambassadors (SSA) club. His involvement as a member of the student body led him to be a part of the organising committees of incredible events such as 'Sunway's Got Talent'. It also gave him the opportunity to give back to the community as he was able to visit Rumah Juara, a children's home and use his videography skills to capture and edit a short video highlight of the visit.

Graeme was also a part of the filming crew for the classes of 2020 and 2021 Sunway Virtual Graduation ceremonies. He mentions that it was an interesting experience having to shoot everything in one day and exporting four different outputs.

Filming and working together with some of my classmates to execute this project is really memorable. What a way to end our degree. -Graeme

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Presently, Graeme is working as an account executive in a digital agency called Blankslate. He looks into coming out with content on a monthly basis and also does a lot of project management from campaigns to giveaways. According to Graeme, he chose to be in this industry even though he graduated with a degree in digital film production because even as he was studying film, he realised that he always had a passion for producing; the person who looks into the logistics of a shoot and not just cameras.

"I can shoot, I can edit, but being a producer really challenged me and I find that interesting. I love to solve problems and come up with solutions (albeit sometimes unorthodox), and being an account executive does just that. Every month we have a new set of "problems" that we need to solve. Dealing with clients, coming up with content direction, managing expectations left, right, and centre. I live for that."

Ultimately, the lessons that he learned in SOA taught and prepared Graeme for the working world. "Under promise, over deliver. This has been a constant mantra of mine, to always over deliver on what is expected. Upon applying in the workplace, it has really helped me to manage my work better."

As for his future plans, Graeme's wishes to do well in his work and eventually build a career out of it.
