RECENT ACTIVITIES

Lunchtime Concerts in October

The lunchtime concerts have made their comeback after a few months of hiatus! This time, two lunchtime concerts were respectively held on 30 September and 3 October at the Live Arts Space.

On 30 September 2019, the Department of Performance and Media were honoured to be able to invite the PEN trio to perform for the students in Sunway University. PEN trio is a woodwind trio and the members are Nora Lewis (Oboe), Phillip O. Paglialonga (Clarinet), and Eric Van der Veer Barner (Bassoon). As they are passionate about performance, education and scholarship, the group is dedicated to expanding the scope of the traditional trio d'anche, which was coined by bassoonist Fernand Oubradous in 1927 to describe the now legendary Trio d'Anches de Paris. During the lunchtime concert, the ensemble performed Three Places in Vienna by Jaren Hinckley, The Sequioa Trio by Jenni Brandon and many more.

The Sutera Ensemble comprises of performers who are also educators and communicators who want to pass on the beauty of classical music to new generations and wider audience. The members of Sutera Ensemble are Angel Lee, the violinist, Andrew Filmer, the violist, Jonathon Oh, the cellist, Loo Bang Hean, a pianist as well as a guest pianist, Carolyn Lo. The programme included a violin-viola duo by Mozart, and another two pieces by Richardson and Faure, followed by a piano duet by Grieg, piano-viola duet by Clarke and Beethoven's C major quartet, 1st movement. Before starting each piece, Dr Andrew Filmer from Sunway University shared short background stories of the composer and the pieces to the audience, in hopes that the audience will be able to gain some insight into the compositions. The concert then ended with the whole ensemble putting together a piece by Beethoven which earned a round of applause from the audience.

Field Trip to MPO Chamber Music Concert

In line with School of Arts Week 8 Workshop week, a group of 50 students from the contemporary music (audio technology) and music performance degree programmes went on a field trip to the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra (MPO) chamber music concert at Dewan Filharmonik Petronas, KLCC on 16 October 2019. This field trip was beneficial to the students as the programme played were being studied in various classes. There are Franz Waxman's Carmen Fantasie which is being studied by 40 students for music history class, and Schubert piano trio which has been studied in the Chamber Music class. Dr Andrew Filmer, who teaches two of the classes mentioned above, along with Programme Leaders Mr Samuel Tan and Ms Christine Yong joined the field trip. The students had a chance to hear some of the performers speak right afterwards, and to find out about their process of preparation and collaboration.

Invited talk at the Harvard Asia Centre

The hour-long talk was attended by 25 post-graduate students, academic staff and was chaired by Professor Peter Der Manuelian, Director of the Harvard Semetic Museum and Barbara Bell Professor of Egyptology. The questions and discussion that followed were lively, productive and will hopefully lead to various collaborations with CRCDM in the near future.



VSMM 2019 Symposium in Canada

Professor Harold Thwaites was the Keynote speaker at VSMM 2019 Symposium- into the future of XR and Exponential Inclusive Tech at OCADU, 17 October in Toronto, Canada. Prof. Thwaites is the International Society on Virtual Systems and Multimedia (VSMM) honorary lifetime President. He spoke to an enthusiastic audience of 38 (local and on-line) staff and students on the "Past, Present and Future of VSMM and Related Technologies", focusing on his work in CRCDM at Sunway University. This year, VSMM is holding 3 symposium events in Toronto, Dublin and Berlin under the banner theme focusing on virtual reality, virtual worlds, accessibility in VR-AR, exponential technologies, and how inclusive design can be integrated for a diverse and inclusive virtual (and actual) reality. The yearly VSMM International Conference was held at Sunway University in October 2016, and could perhaps return in the coming years.

Media Talk on Nomophobia

"Are you addicted to your phone? Do you feel anxious when you are not with your phone, wondering if there are any important notifications or messages or calls you'll miss? Chances are, you are addicted to your phone. Nomophobia, "no more phone phobia" is an irrational fear of being away from your phone. It is the constant need to pick up your phone and respond to any of the notifications."

Dr. Prem Kumar Shanmugam, a psychologist on compulsive disorders and addictions was invited to Sunway University on 3 October 2019 to deliver a talk regarding smartphone addiction. Dr. Prem started off the talk with an introduction of what 'Nomophobia' is and what compulsive behaviours are. Further on, he explained how 'Nomophobia' can be diagnosed as an addiction based on the 'ABCDE' (Abstain, Behavioural control, Craving, Diminished, Emotional Response) diagnosis. With that, he was able to clearly explain to the students why and how smartphone addiction is a serious issue. Dr. Prem did not fail to provide statistics on smartphone addiction as well, providing full evidence of how it is affecting our lives today.

One of the most interesting part of the talk was when Dr. Prem introduced "Maslow's Hierarchy 2.0" whereby the 'physiological needs' becomes WiFi and mobile devices. Consequently, 'safety needs' then becomes passwords, Google Maps and Waze. 'Belonging and love needs together with esteem needs' becomes social media such as WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, Tinder. Lastly, 'self-actualisation needs' becomes platforms such as Pinterest, LinkedIN and YouTube.

Isn't it eye-opening how dependant we are on our mobile devices today? Though our devices are important, and plays a major role in our daily lives, remember to use it with caution; don't let it become an addiction!

INTRODUCING SOA STAFF AND STUDENT

Dr Goh Yi Sheng has been with Sunway University's School of Arts for a little over a year now, and she currently teaches Sustainable Design in the Department of Art and Design. She had spent eighteen years of her time abroad studying and working before deciding to come back to her hometown, Malaysia in 2018. Dr Goh had pursued her Bachelor's degree and Masters degree majoring in Industrial Design in Taiwan and the United States respectively, and later obtained her PhD in Consumer and Design Sciences in the United States. Prior to her return to Malaysia, she had also taught in the National Cheng Kung University in Tainan, Taiwan.

As a lecturer, she prioritises the experiential learning method for her students. Hence, she often brings her students out for field trips, allowing them to gain real life experiences rather than relying on textbooks and the Internet. Recently, she brought her students along with students and a lecturer from the School of Hospitality to the Sungai Lima Fishing Village in Klang for a field trip. The students were able to see the village environment with their own eyes, talk to the people in the village to learn about the villagers' lives and see how they can use design to contribute to the local community. The Sungai Lima Fishing Village is also one of Dr Goh's research project titled Design for Sustainability - Social Innovation Project in Sungai Lima. In this project, she proposes ways to promote sustainability in the village through raising awareness of the value of their own culture, educating them about the importance of mangrove and birds (both resident and migratory), and creating new sustainable business such as eco-tourism. Dr Goh explained the reason behind selecting this village as her subject of research was due to how she feels connected to the villagers and how their friendliness, purity and sincerity motivated her to help them.

Dr Goh sees design as something more than the aesthetics, but also providing solutions to problems. "Design is not all about prettiness and being artsy, but also to understand the underlying needs and to work with uncertainties and pull together different streams of expertise to create solutions to solve the problem within the context," said Dr Goh. Therefore, she hopes that more people will understand the broader concept of design and be more open to discover the opportunities in sustainable design.
