Dr. Perline Siek Hwee Ling is pleased to announce that her research artwork has been selected as the book cover for [Gumum+ism]. Gumum + ism is an event that invited a total of 80 local and international artists in one location to exchange knowledge, network and collaborate in the arts to promote and support the environmental conservation of Lake Chini.

The program is supported by the East Coast Economic Region Development Council (ECERDC); National Gallery of Visual Arts; Ministry of Tourism, Malaysia; Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM) through Tasik Chini Research Center (PPTC) and Pahang Tourism, local art groups such as Silence Art Group and PeRUPA & PeRUPA TV. This exhibition showcases the artworks to allow audiences to understand the values, natural resources, and communities (Orang Asal) of this magical land; where these creative and beautiful works of art will also be exhibited at the Curatorial Gallery, Room Academic Heritage Museum at Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, Bangi in early 2022.

AZMYL YUNOR TAKES ON 'ORANG KITA' IN LATEST SINGLE AND MUSIC VIDEO

Come Malaysia Day 2021, Bangi-based troubadour Azmyl Yunor launched the music video for the song 'Orang Kita' - the latest single from his latest album John Bangi Blues - on his YouTube channel (<u>https://www.youtube.com/azmylyunor</u>).

Released amidst the backdrop of persisting identity politics in Malaysia, it also marks the 1st anniversary of the album's digital launch on his Bandcamp page, 10 days earlier than the CD format launch last year.



"As an ethnic Malay, you'll probably be familiar with the phrase 'orang kita' being bandied around, obviously referring to fellow Malays within conversations between Malays. For sure different ethnic groups have their own phrases to describe themselves also but I thought 'orang kita' is an interesting phrase to repurpose and make it more inclusive since 'kita' means 'us'. Identity is always fluid but it is also a powerful currency wielded by those in power for their own benefits to sway the masses."

"The song is a symbolic resistance to this – if you strip away all the layers of race, gender, and religion – institutions that construct differences – we're all just human – hence the 'AKU MANUSIA!' refrain. We are all the same species. Never forget that," he added.

""Let's celebrate being Malaysian with a capital M! I'm just sick and tired of the racist rhetoric that still persists in this country. The real Malaysia is enshrined in the Constitution, not the words and slander of politicians."

Directed by aspiring writer and director Alina Wong, the music video was shot at different stages early August last year. "I was inspired by the odd state of arts in Malaysia, where art is encouraged, but the artists themselves are held back by written or unspoken rules. I just love the idea of contradiction, chaos and everything that doesn't make sense, so the story just spiralled from that basis," she explained.

"I guess this is dedicated to all artists and art lovers out there, and well, to those who love to control it too. The song, to me, is about questioning who Malaysia actually belongs to - does it really belong to all of us who live here? It explores a chaotic rage and frustration as the song tries to answer this," she added.



The 10-song album was recorded live in the studio in three hours in November 2019 with Ammar Khairi (The Maharajah Commission) on drums and Kristopher Chong (Salammusik) on bass and produced by Ariff Akhir – a creative collaboration that began with 2010's Warga album.

Bucking the trend, the album is still not available on Spotify or any of the usual digital streaming services. It is exclusively available digitally on his <u>Bandcamp</u> page and his <u>YouTube</u> page.

All his recent music videos have included English subtitles so that foreign audiences may also understand the lyrics and contexts of the songs.

Azmyl Yusof (also known by his stage name 'Azmyl Yunor') is a renowned Malaysian bi-lingual independent singer-songwriter, musician, radio host, and writer who has performed in countries around the region since the late 1990s. He has published his research on the cultural politics of Malaysian music subcultures and mediated moral panics, and is currently researching on contemporary protest songs in Malaysia. Since 1997, he has released nine albums and three Extended Plays (EP) as a solo artiste and also albums with his other band projects.

DR. ZUHAILI WINS THE SILVER AWARD FOR TALPI CONFERENCE 2021

Recently, Dr. Zuhaili won the Silver award for a research paper competition organised by Universiti Teknologi MARA (UiTM) at the Teaching and Learning Poster Ideas (TALPI) Conference 2021. His paper, Enhancing Graduate Employability Through Community-Based Learning Project, was a collaboration between his fellow researcher in Universiti Tun Abdul Razak (UNIRAZAK) and himself.

The TALPI Conference is an annual event that aims to contribute to developing innovative techniques in teaching and new educational approaches in education. This year's event drew 173 submissions from Malaysia, Indonesia, and Brunei, showcasing the strength and diversity of research in teaching and learning strategies.





Below is the abstract of the paper:

"Graduate employability is used as a measurement by both Higher Education Institutions (HEI) and employers on the graduates' marketability. It has shifted from demand-led skills sets toward a holistic view of "graduate attributes" (Ghavifekr et al., 2016). Most literature acknowledges the definition of graduate employability as a set of graduated skills, understandings, and personal attributes that make graduates succeed in their chosen fields (Saibon and Kamis, 2019). This research is mixed methods research that utilizes both qualitative and quantitative methods. The research identifies the primary attributes that contribute to Graduate Employability and evaluates the effectiveness of the new **Community-Based Learning Framework in**



enhancing Graduate Employability. The research method framework is divided into pre-design and development (focus aroup) and post-design and development (online survey). The predesign & development phase encompassed a focus group with twenty (20) recruitment specialists from various industries. Through the predesign and development (focus group),

the researcher discovered five (5) primary attributes (Emotional and Social Intelligence, Resilience, Thought Leadership, Cognitive Flexibility, and Digital Literacy) that employers see as rising in prominence. These attributes were later adapted to design a new Community-Based Learning Framework, the Razakian's Community-Based Learning Framework. After three (3) months of implementing the Razakian's Community-Based Learning Framework to the final year students at UNIRAZAK, twenty (20) recruitment specialists from the pre-design & development phase were contacted to complete an online survey. In this phase, a model fit analysis was performed using Poisson Regression to identify the correlations between variables in the dataset. The result reflects an optimistic employer's attitude towards the Razakian's Community-Based Learning Framework and an improvement in UNIRAZAK Graduate Employability by 28% in 2019 based on the Ministry of Higher Education (MoHE) Graduate Tracer Study."

Zuhaili graduated from Syracuse University under the guidance of advertising gurus, Donny Deutsch and Edward Jones with a degree in Advertising Creative. Right after graduation, Zuhaili joined McCann Erickson in New York and worked his way up as an Art Director, working on various accounts like Mastercard, Conde Nast, Crate & Barrel, Avis, Breyers, Marc Jacobs, Vera Wang and Mercedes Benz Fashion Week. Having been a finalist for the Cannes Lion twice, Zuhaili bagged in three Golds and Best of Show from the Advertising Federation of New York. He was inducted into New York Art Director Club in 2009 and was chosen as one of the Top 10 Art Directors in the States for 2009. After eight years of interlude in New York City, Zuhaili came back to Malaysia to become an educational advocate and a creative consultant. Currently, Zuhaili is burning the candle at both ends in curating borderless learning and writing a weekly style column, Gaya Seri, in Utusan Malaysia.


'TUITION CENTRE', DEBUT EP FROM 'SUBANG ROCK' BAND, SHOPLIFTERS
