

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Sunway University College Receives a Foundation

Chancellor and Begins
Affiliation with Lancaster
University

YBhg Tan Sri Dato' Seri Dr Jeffrey Cheah was officially installed as Sunway University College's first Foundation Chancellor, on 19 September 2006. It was the first time ever for a corporate chief to be given this singular honour.

Historically, the mace was a weapon carried into battle by knights and warlike bishops, reflecting their status and prowess in the field. In the University context, it was carried as a weapon to protect the Chancellor, but it has now evolved into a purely ceremonial device signifying the dignity and authority of the Chancellor. The Mace, designed by Royal Selangor Pewter is 4.5 ft in length and made of teakwood and pewter with 24 carat gold-plating.

He took advantage of the occasion to share his vision for the University's role in the future of education in Malaysia and globally.

The hour-long ceremony, steeped in tradition, was officiated by His Royal Highness Sultan of Selangor, Sultan Sharafuddin Idris AlHaj and was witnessed by a large number of distinguished guests, members of faculties, scholars and staff.

It was in the early 1980s that the origins of Sunway University College began taking shape in the imagination and courage of this visionary individual. Known for his active and distinguished business career, Tan Sri Jeffrey has demonstrated a long time interest in Higher Education.

He founded Sunway College as it was known then in 1987 with 200 students. Today, 20 years on, Sunway University College has a total student population of 7,000, pursuing 17 different academic programmes or courses.

In Tan Sri Jeffrey Cheah's own words: "Higher education remains vital to the growth, sovereignty and progress of Malaysia. Our singular purpose is to make Sunway the premier private University in the Asean Region."

"We must have a global outlook and display leadership qualities in competing in the international arena. We must continually bench mark ourselves against international standards. Together we will inspire great achievements and together we will elevate the human spirit through learning and discovery." Moving words, indeed.

The Selangor Sultan's presence, must have evoked interesting memories for many as the original institution, was declared open by the Sultan's late father, on July 25, 1987.

The unveiling of the new coat of arms of Sunway University College with the motto "Fortuna Eruditis Favet" was among the highlights of this traditional ceremony. The University College's Acting Vice-Chancellor, Professor Jarlath Ronayne, then spoke of the Grant of Arms to Sunway University College by the College of Arms, London in May 2006 and also described the devisal.

The other symbols of the Chancellor's office, the Mace and the Chancellor's Chair, which were commissioned for the occasion, were unveiled.

As an aside to the installation ceremony, Sunway University College signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) with Lancaster University, England, the day before to initiate an academic collaboration.

The MoA was signed on behalf of Lancaster University's Vice-Chancellor, Professor Paul Wellings and Professor Ronayne, for Sunway University College.

This was witnessed by Lord Taylor of Blackburn from Lancaster University and Tan Sri Dato' Seri (Dr) Jeffrey Cheah. With the signing, students completing their Sunway University College Honours degree will be awarded scrolls from both Institutions. The degree disciplines under this collaboration include business management, business studies, psychology, information technology, information systems, multimedia systems as well as in international hospitality management and international tourism management.

"Lancaster University established in 1964, is very selective in collaborating with other institutions of higher learning," said Professor Paul Wellings. We chose Sunway University College as it has a track record of producing high achieving individuals. Its academic standards have been consistent and most exemplary", he added.

Professor Wellings pointed out that through the agreement, Lancaster University would bring its knowledge of high quality university education to Sunway University College. "Together we will create a portfolio of university degrees that carry English quality along with a Malaysian spirit."

Tan Sri Jeffrey described the signing of the MoA as further recognition of Sunway University College's mission to provide top quality education for its students.

As an academic institution providing both world class international and homegrown programmes, Sunway University College has acquired the reputation for producing excellent results. Truly it has fulfilled the vision of Tan Sri Jeffrey Cheah: to become a first class educational institution and a 'Harvard of the East' in due time.

The Grant of Arms

The Acting Vice-Chancellor of Sunway University College, Professor Jarlath Ronayne spoke of the use of a Coat of Arms in universities, as a symbol of independent authority and high prestige, going back to the Middle Ages, when the colleges of the ancient universities were granted Arms, usually based on those of their founders.

Over the past 20 years, Sunway University College has produced students with outstanding potential, and well-regarded academic credentials. In 2004, Sunway College was elevated to the status of a University College.

It is essential for Sunway University College to adopt a unique, memorable emblem both as an identifier, and a symbol of the authority it holds as an institution of higher learning. The independence of the universities and their powers to award their own degrees in all subjects has, historically, been represented by the granting of the Coat of Arms.

Sunway University College is the first and only private university college in the region that was granted the Coat of Arms by the College of Arms in London. The Coat of Arms has three elements, namely the Crest, the Shield and the Motto. The Arms, which was devised by the Richmond Herald of the College of Arms, contains three geometric shapes, known as "piles", each "charged" with a golden sun. Together, the piles, form a "W" and with the three suns, suggests the name Sunway.


The Coat of Arms was unveiled on September 19, 2006 during the Installation of YBhg Tan Sri Dato' Seri (Dr) Jeffrey Cheah as the first Foundation Chancellor of Sunway University College by His Royal Highness Sultan Sharafuddin Idris Shah, the Sultan of Selangor.

Professor Jarlath highlighted the fact that a Coat of Arms was given by the Supreme Authorities of a country as an indication of importance of the institution and the authority it holds to grant its own degrees.

The Crest, which is placed on top

of the Shield, consists of a Malaysian tiger, grasping a torch, symbolizing learning and teaching at the institution.

The motto for the Coat of Arms "Fortuna Eruditis Favet" derives from Louis Pasteur's famous phrase "dans les champs de l'observation, la chance ne sourit qu'aux esprits bien prepares", which translates as "in the field of observation, chance favours the well prepared mind." In other words, serendipitous discovery arising out of an unexpected observation is not a random event; one has to have a prepared mind in order to recognize the implications of the observation.

Handpicked by Professor Jarlath himself, he believed that the University College deserves a motto that carries an implication that the purpose of a higher education is to prepare minds well for a fulfilling and fortunate life. It was decided that the motto should be in Latin, the language of learning and scholarship in medieval times. The phrase was translated by Professor Thomas N. Mitchell, Provost and Professor of Latin at Trinity College, Dublin.

"Being granted the Coat of Arms, is indeed a significant recognition, as it signifies Sunway University College's high standing in the international arena. It is a distinction granted only to those individuals, families or organizations who are judged by the College of Arms to be worthy of it. Its uniqueness in the private higher education sector of Malaysia reflects Sunway University's achievements as a pioneering institution that sets quality and integrity above all else in the delivery of its educational programmes" said Professor Jarlath.

Sunway University College combines the best of long-established traditions with a frontier spirit of originality and innovation.

For 2007, approximately RM1 million has been allocated for research work, training and development of staff.

New programmes would include the honours degree in Business Studies, Bachelor of Science (Hons) International Tourism Management, Bachelor of Science (Hons) International Hospitality Management, Bachelor of Science (Hons) International Conventions & Events Management and Bachelor of Science (Hons) Retail Marketing Management, In the pipeline are the honours degree in Accounting & Finance, honours degree in Law and a Diploma in Nursing.

Other 20th Anniversary celebration activities include a Treasure Hunt in April, a Community Carnival in May and a Gala Dinner in October. An International Academic Conference will be held in 2008.

Jega believes in involving himself in many extra-curricular activities such as the Student Council, organising the Youth@Research and the World Cyber Games competition. I feel that these activities help broaden the mind and develop my leadership skills. "Despite being busy I like to keep focused on my studies and I hope to be gainfully employed and financially secure someday so that I can give back to the community".


For Candy Lee Pik Shin, who lives with her grandmother, the scholarship has enabled her to pursue the ACCA at Sunway. "The environment at Sunway's accounting division, Sunway TES where I study, is an inspiring one. Most of the lecturers are dedicated which drives me to work hard" said Candy. All community scholars are well looked after by qualified counsellors at the Student Services Department. Workshops and sessions on topics such as self-esteem and coping skills in time management, adaptation, goal setting and emotional quotient (EQ) are imparted by Lee's team to help the scholars realise their full potential and dreams.

To-date 24.6 million has been given out by the Sunway Education Trust Fund of Sunway University College. All surpluses from Sunway University College are ploughed back into the Trust to be used for scholarships, upgrading of facilities and for research. Sunway University College is the only private University College to operate under a Trust.



Korean Students Learn English at Sunway

Students from the Su Won Baking and Cooking Academy in Su Won, Korea made a trip to Sunway University College not to holiday but to learn English. The three-week residential programme was held during the students' semester break, and was run by Sunway's Language and Compulsory Subjects Centre. It was certainly worthwhile as an eye-opener for the Korean students to be in Malaysia and to experience its rich multicultural heritage while learning English.

The 17 students were accompanied by a teacher and their principal, Mr Lee Won Young. As English is not widely spoken in Korea, the English language proficiency of the students was low. It is understood that the students were given a three-week crash course before they arrived. However, their enthusiasm levels were high as they were very eager to practise their spoken English with others.

The Korean students with similar English proficiency levels were placed into groups for their written classes, which were held in the mornings and the students combined together as a whole for oral classes which took place before lunch. The afternoons were dedicated to workshops and the students were given access to computers.

As a break from routine, the Korean students were taught English through the singing of English songs and the reading of English poetry as well as role-play. Sunway's School of Hospitality, Tourism and Leisure Management treated the students to two workshops on Dining Etiquette & Wine Appreciation and Pastry Making. The purpose was to encourage them to use the English language in practical and familiar contexts.

There was also time out for rest and relaxation for the Korean students when they were taken to Sunway Pyramid and to a local Pasar Malam (night market) by student ambassadors. These ambassadors, current students of the Intensive English Programme at Sunway University College, hail from Uzbekistan, Indonesia, Korea and Malaysia.

They added an international flavour and enriched the Korean students' experience at Sunway.

The Vacation English School ended with a graduation during which the Korean students and the Sunway student ambassadors put up an impressive concert to show off the students' newly acquired English speaking skills.




The books are available at major bookshops such as MPH, Times, Popular and Kinokuniya and cost RM17 each.

Tan hopes to incorporate mountain clean-ups as a regular feature of the students' community activities that they have to fulfil in their curriculum. "We don't mind the work however the only problem is that the cost of purchasing the materials for the clean-up can be quite high. 
The CIMP at Sunway is the largest in Malaysia with more than 600 students. 80% of the teaching staff are Canadian certified, thus providing a truly Canadian learning experience. Students study an identical syllabus to the Grade 12 in Ontario and graduate with an Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

Dr. Rosemary Gannon, Director of the CIMP at Sunway said, "the CIMP offers formative and summative learning with 70% of the syllabi based on coursework and 30% on the final exams". Students may choose subjects without locking into a particular stream while thinking and enquiry, communication and application are the main approaches to learning.

Among the graduates were 15 Subject Award winners for a total of 18 subjects. 43 students achieved 80% in their marks and were awarded the status of Ontario Scholars. Among them, three students achieved distinctions. The flavour of the CIMP programme is leaning towards being a cosmopolitan one, as about half of the students come from as many as 44 different countries.

The Class Valedictorian for the December 2006 graduation, Ali Anjum who hails from Pakistan said, "the CIMP allows students to experience learning at its best, with dedicated teachers who bring lessons to life, with activities and class projects that open the mind to make learning an adventure"

Ali Anjum, who had 7 'A's, was active

Sunway AusMat Students Sweep Chemistry Awards

The recent graduates of the Australian Matriculation (AusMat) pre-University programme achieved excellent results among all the AusMat providers worldwide in Western Australia (WA), Indonesia, Vietnam, China and Malaysia

Out of the 266 Sunway AusMat students who sat the November 2006 examinations, 30 students (11%) achieved a TER of 99 and were in the top 1% in the world. 90 students (33.8%) had TER above 90 and were in the top 10% worldwide. 4 Sunway AusMat students had an almost perfect TER of 99.90. Overall 55% of all Sunway AusMat students had a TER of 85 and above. There were a total of 20,382 students enrolled in AusMat around the world who sat the same examinations.

Two Sunway AusMat students, Chelfi Chua Zhi Fei and Chong Wen Khang were Special Subject Award recipients for being the highest scorers for Chemistry among all WA schools and overseas providers. Chelfi will be pursuing Pharmacy at the University of Queensland and Chong will be studying Medicine at the University of Melbourne.

8 other students, Chew Li Suan, Christina Ooi Chel-See, Ho Yun Ying, Ivy Chiang Kim Ni, Lim Li Ping, Ng Ee Liang, Ravind Singh Pandher and Sharon Wong Leh Ing were in the top 0.5% in the world for Chemistry and earned Special Certificates of Distinction. Sunway AusMat was the only institution with this unprecedented record of receiving the highest number of awards and certificates among all AusMat progarmme providers, in Chemistry.

Arjun Sivanesan, Han Yuet Ling and Lim Sue Lyn received Special Certificates of Distinction Awards in Accounting which is in recognition for being within the top 0.5% worldwide for the subject.

Arjun also participated in the 2006
Business Educators of Western
Australia (BEWA) Year 12 Accounting
Competition in Western Australia and
emerged joint First Place winner for
his efforts. Lim Sue Lyn was in Second
Place. The level of competition was
high as it was extended beyond
Western Australia to AusMat students in
South East Asia as well.


Not surprisingly, Arjun and Han Yuet Ling will be pursuing Actuarial Science at the Australian National University and Lim Sue Lyn will read Economics at the University of Melbourne.

Christina Ooi Chel-See was the top student worldwide for English as a Second Language and she will be studying Medicine at the University of Melbourne. Kong Yue Jin and Afrah Binti Mohd were in the top 0.5% for Malay Advanced and had Special Certificates of Distinction for the subject, among the world providers for AusMat as well.

89% of Sunway AusMat students of the graduating class qualified for some of the best universities in the world to do a course of their choice. Other courses favoured by top students were Pharmacy and Biotechnology. Overall 32 AusMat graduates have accepted places to read Medicine all over the world, out of these, 12 places in Medicine were offered to Sunway AusMat students at Monash University.

The Year 12 Australian curriculum which started at Sunway in 1988 is overseen by the Curriculum Council of Western Australia, on behalf of the Government of Western Australia. The main advantage of the Sunway AusMat is that 80% of the programme is application based to encourage critical thinking. The world is a classroom and learning is facilitated through the exchange of ideas and views. Students are encouraged to question and their creative and analytical talents are reflected in the high quality of their results and assignments.

Mr Hugh Alguire, International Officer of the Curriculum Council of Western Australia who was at the recent graduation dinner was most impressed with the exceptional forecast results of the students. He said "The good performance of the students may be a reflection of the synergistic relationship which has evolved over the many years between Sunway AusMat and the Curriculum Council".



Dexter and his team are working closely with the ICT R & D Centre at the School of Computer Technology to look into commercialising their business idea.



Chew Jeen Sern was from the CIMP.



When the Asian Games Ice Hockey Event drew to an end, Team Malaysia managed an eighth ranking out of 11, not bad at all for boys who hail from a country that is undoubtedly too hot to have natural ice.
