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
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






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

From then onwards, Chris Bonington started climbing in Wales and after his National Service, he served in the army and indulged this love for two years as a mountaineering instructor in the Army Outward Bound School.

After completing his studies at University College School, London, Bonington entered the corporate world as a management trainee at Unilever. Don Whillans invited him to join a mountaineering expedition to Patagonia. The lure was irresistible and he was put in a tight spot. While requesting a release for this expedition, he was given an ultimatum to choose between his career at Unilever or mountaineering. He chose the less conventional one.

Today the 73 year-old, Sir Christian Bonington is firmly established as one of Britain's leading climbers. He has scaled the greatest peaks on earth and earned a livelihood from photo-journalism and mountaineering. He has been on 19 Himalayan expeditions, including four to Everest and the first ascent of the south face of Annapurna.

Among his great climbs are the first British ascent of the Eiger North Wall with Ian Clough in 1962 and the great south face climb of the Annapurna in 1970. Sir Chris, as he prefers to be called, led three Everest expeditions and finally in 1985 at the age of 50, he reached the roof of the world, as an advisor to a Norwegian Everest Expedition led by shipping magnate Arne Naess.

His long list of achievements in the mountaineering world earned him a knighthood for the sport in 1996. Lancaster University awarded Sir Bonington an honorary degree (DSc Hons) in 1986 and in 2005 he was installed as its Chancellor.



Sir Christian Bonington was recently invited by Sunway University College to give a talk under Sunway's Distinguished Speakers Series. The well-illustrated talk "I Chose to Climb" photos and footage dramatically unfolded the lessons learnt on the mountain which can be applied as strategies for living and succeeding. Sir Chris drew parallels from this with the world of business, management and leadership.

In the first expedition led by him to the South face of Annapurna, Sir Chris shared that leadership is not so much a matter about giving orders as capturing the loyalty and enthusiasm of a team through consultation and inspiration. Sir Chris had to endure both joy and tragedy as after the expedition made a successful bid for the summit, Sir Chris's trusted companion, lan Clough was killed in an avalanche on the final stages down. With mixed feelings and a deep sense of loss, Sir Christian Bonington went on further expeditions.

In his fourth and successful attempt to the Everest, also known as the third pole, the highest level of teamwork was demonstrated. Sir Chris acknowledged that the Norwegian Everest expedition which had placed 18 climbers and sherpas on the summit in three separate ascents, was remarkable for a single expedition. Sir Chris emphasized "It was made possible because of superb planning and organisation but most of all from teamwork among members"

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As mountaineers know, a successful climber does not fight the mountain but must become acquainted and attuned to it, interpreting the signs and taking appropriate precautions and measures. He needs to adapt his strategies to suit the changing of the elements, the terrain and the capabilities of team members.

So climbing a mountain can be a strong metaphor for managing or leading a company or business towards ultimate success. Indeed Sir Chris reminds one that there are three things one should practice in successful management and leadership. He said "Firstly you must be very clear of your vision. Sometimes it is easy to lose clarity in objectives. Secondly, one should inspire and involve others in the leading process and lastly care for the team, even as you step back and delegate, cultivating leadership in those around you". Judging from all the experiences that Sir Chris has been through, it does help too, if you love what vou are doing.

The Distinguished Speakers Series started in 1988 at Sunway University College as a community effort to bring talks by scholars to the public and provide a stimulating intellectual platform for students. Previous world renowned speakers have included Sir David Williams, Professor Michael Furmston, Professor Wang Gungwu and professors and academics from the Harvard Business School.

While Sir Chris was here, he was accompanied by his Vice-Chancellor Professor Paul Wellings, who delivered a talk on "How is Globalisation Influencing the Development of Higher Education" the day before Sir Chris Bonington's talk under the same Distinguished Speakers Series.

Lancaster University's link with Sunway University College was sealed earlier with the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement on 18 September 2006 to initiate an academic affiliation with Sunway to offer joint honours degrees





Memorable Graduation Ceremony with a Special Diplomate

As graduation ceremonies go, they seem to be all the same. Not the one recently at Sunway University College. There was every reason to be proud as Tan Sri Dato' Seri (Dr) Jeffrey Cheah, the founder of Sunway University College in his first official duty as Foundation Chancellor gave out degrees and diplomas to 538 graduates from the School of Computer Technology; School of Hospitality, Tourism and Leisure Management and the School of Creative Arts & Communication.

It was also the first time Sunway awarded degrees and diplomas from programmes developed entirely by Sunway academia. Tan Sri Dato' Seri (Dr) Jeffrey Cheah was installed in a grand ceremony as its Foundation Chancellor in the presence of the Sultan of Selangor, HRH Sultan Sharafuddin Shah AlHaj in September last year.

Among the graduates was Awangku Mohd Azizul Amri Pingiran Sarpuddin who received his Diploma in Computer Studies. Preferring to be called Amri, he has been physically disabled and wheelchair bound since an accident in 1998. Amri hails from Brunei.

Upbeat about receiving his diploma during the graduation, Amri said "I am proud to have completed my diploma in computer studies". He added "As I love computers, I found this course interesting. I owe my success to my lecturers and friends who were very helpful which was definitely a "plus" for me". Amri has just completed his Bachelor of Information Technology (Networking) and will receive his degree in another ceremony next year.

When asked if his disabilities were a challenge, Amri said "Thankfully, Sunway University College is a wheelchair friendly institution and was easily accessible. I

believe that one should never give up and - when there is a will there is a way no matter what the obstacles are".

Degrees conferred were honours degrees in information systems, information technology and multimedia studies. These precede the joint honours degrees that are now currently offered by Sunway University College in affiliation with its partner, Lancaster University in the UK in the near future. The first cohorts under this arrangement are currently underway in the areas of computer technology, business, hospitality and psychology.

It was a big production with 60 foreign artists, 12 local child actors, 50 local musicians and technical support crew. The involvement provided 15 first and second-year Sunway students with valuable professional experience and insights into the workings of a Broadway-like musical. They were hired by Intan Budaya Presentations to provide support backstage and in the wardrobe and merchandise departments.

The three-week long engagement began with an intense two-and-a-half-day load-in, where seven 20' ft containers carrying set pieces, props, costumes, lighting and sound equipment were set up onstage. The first two days were hectic with major rigging; lighting, sound and costumes set up; the laying out of the dance floor and the assembly of huge props. Once assembled, the beautifully crafted sets and props required little of the audience's imagination to be transported to the old world of Siam.

A full dress rehearsal was scheduled on the afternoon of the third day, followed by the opening performance on that very same evening. The eight students who were the wardrobe crew had to learn to work very fast. Together with two local professionals, they ran a tight ship, getting their show cues down in just half-a-day. They had to make sure that all their assigned actors were each clad in their correct costumes for each scene. The costumes, which were exceptionally brilliant, had been designed by Tim Yip, the Oscar-winning art director and designer for Crouching Tiger Hidden Dragon.

The Sunway Group adopted SMK Bandar Sunway as part of its CSR programme. William and Haziq were given the privilege to join the practical culinary and kitchen operations classes of the first year of the Diploma in Hospitality and Tourism Management programme at Sunway.

Both William and Haziq benefit from a tailored curriculum with a more vocational focus. They have been given tasks at the G.O.L.D Street Café a signature project by SMK Bandar Sunway which provides skills training for the learning disabled class or Generating Opportunities for Learning Disables (G.O.L.D).

"The students have begun to accept them and realize that there are others in our community who are not like them" said Choong Siew Lee, the chef instructor. "It is really encouraging to see this interaction and to see our students becoming more attuned and sensitive to William and Haziq" she added.

William and Haziq are very positive and had no problems picking up skills. The two became well assimilated as the other students socialised with them during lunch and after class. Asked how they found the classes, William replied "They were interesting and we made a lot of friends" to which Haziq concurred "We learnt a lot in class"

William is stirring as the other students observe.

This initiative was part of the 6-month Job Placement Programme under the 3R Corporate Social Responsibility by the Sunway Group. Sunway University College took in the students for training before they were attached with the Sunway Resort Hotel and Spa. Elizabeth Lee, Executive Director of

Sunway University College said "We fully support the Group's objective to equip intellectually challenged students with skills that they can use in the real world. This training experience is invaluable as it teaches them independence and self-confidence".



Sunway Alumnus mixes Studies with Entrepreneurship





A former Canadian International Matriculation Programme (CIMP) student at Sunway University College in 2004, Tan Hai Liang who today is a final year student at Monash University, Sunway Campus, is a living testimony that you're never too young to materialize dreams.



Hai Liang is doing a Bachelor in Business & Commerce degree and is only 21 years old, yet he is the owner of a food kiosk at the Sunway University College cafeteria.

During his CIMP project, Hai Liang noticed there was a lack of food variety at its cafeteria. "The CIMP involved students in projects and I chose to satisfy that curiosity with a project of setting up a kiosk in a food court", Hai Liang recalled. "As 70% of the final marks were based on assignment and the rest on projects, this made us more confident as we developed communication and

presentation skills in the course of our project work" he added.

While doing his project, he went on to explore the trends in dining and food tastes by speaking with friends who studied at Taylors University College which is just a stone's throw from Asia Café in Subang Jaya. That was when he soon realized that the food business was viable. "The CIMP really thought me how to go about starting a business" he said.

With his affable nature, he had no problems negotiating with the Lemon Grass BBQ chain and after paying royalties to use the name, Hai Liang and childhood friend Quek Wee Siong ventured into starting up a Lemon Grass BBQ Chicken rice outlet at Sunway in July 2006. "We each put in RM15,000 to start the business" said Hai Liang. The rest is history.

Hai Liang is proud of the fact that his RM15,000 portion was not a handout from family but was all his savings amassed from ang pow money and "reward" money from his parents for doing well in school since his childhood.

Wee Siong who is pursuing a Chemical Engineering degree at the University of Nottingham, leaves him to handle most of the business preferring to be a passive partner. "I keep a close eye on the business and drop by between classes" said Hai Liang. "I have not really started on promotions yet" he emphasized. But Hai Liang added "Maintaining the food quality and ensuring hygiene is important."

Not one to be complacent, Hai Liang strives to find ways to attract customers especially in the face of fierce competition. "My focus is on good customer service and I train my staff to be polite and friendly" he said. At the moment the business is stable and improving.

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So what does Hai Liang do to unwind after all his studies and business? "I have just picked up golf and go to the driving range when I can. Golf is excellent for networking and it teaches one about strategy" he said. "In life, it is very similar to golf as we need to ask ourselves, what do I want to do next?". This business student gets inspiration from reading. One of his favourite books is "The Art of War" by Sun Tzu. In his free time, Hai Liang catches up with reading books on economics and finance and follows the Edge closely every week. He watches Bernama News and Bloomberg too to keep abreast with what's happening in the world's economy.

Friends anchor him and are very much a part of his life. Hai Liang has five close friends (two were CIMP mates) who were his primary schoolmates in Klang. "We support and encourage each other and share information. Our big dream is to run a corporation together in the future", he said. At the moment two are studying in Australia, and three are in the UK, pursuing business, quantity surveying and medicine. When he has the time he makes trips to see his friends in Australia and to check out the food and beverage industry there. He attributes some of his success to his mentor, an older friend from church, who has advised him in the last eight years.



The scholarship provides £10,800 (approximately RM73,000) for the duration of the MBA and it covers full fees. This award is based on leadership potential, intellectual ability, commitment to public service, and likelihood of "making a difference."

This is the first year the Professor Doug Wood's scholarship award is given and it is for only one individual in a year and only for those applying for the MBA for Financial Managers & Finance Professionals.

ADTP Students given WMU Scholarship

At a certificate presentation recently, the American Degree Transfer Program (ADTP) at Sunway University College had reason to celebrate as a record number of 24 of its students, were honored in the Dean's List of Western Michigan University (WMU) and four students were awarded the Presidential Scholarship by WMU, valued at USD8,000 per year. This is the first time the ADTP at Sunway has had so many of its students earn this prestigious scholarship from WMU in one occasion.

The overjoyed WMU-bound scholars are: Yenni Chen from Indonesia, who will be reading Industrial Engineering; Lee Pei Li who will study Economics, Ng Sue-Lynn who has set her sights on Psychology and Mohammed Arafatul Islam from Bangladesh, who will be pursuing Electrical Engineering.

The scholarships could not have come at a better time as this year marks the 20th year of Sunway University College partnership with WMU. The strong collaboration has established Sunway's transfer program with WMU and as such enabled Sunway to offer a True-Credit American degree transfer program. As Sunway students credit transfers are already benchmarked against WMU which is widely recognized, they may transfer into any other US University should they decide not to enjoy the twinning benefits of WMU.

Ng Sue-Lynn's younger sister, Ng Sue-Yenn will be transferring to WMU's College of Fine Arts to pursue a degree in Musical Theatre Performance. Sue-Yenn is one of the few from Sunway's history to be accepted into this course. Sue-Yenn's talent for singing and dancing saw her win the Seventeen magazine's Star Search Talent Competition, recently in which she won the first prize. She was also in the musical "That was the Year" which played at KL Pac.

Among the students who will be transferring to other universities is Lee Jin Wei, a former State swimmer from Johor who is heading for the Pennsylvania State University, University Park Campus. The University is ranked the top 48th university in the US. Jin Wei will be pursuing a degree in Sports Science. Jin Wei was active in football and rugby and served as a part-time


swimming coach at Sunway University College.

Yenni and Arafatul have chosen well as WMU has a range of excellent engineering programs and WMU is ranked 19 out of the 50 top undergraduate Engineering Programs in the USA by US News.

By completing part of the degree in Sunway University College for the first 20-24 months and then transferring to the US for the other 20-24 months, a student will save 40% of the entire cost. Students can join the ADTP after completing secondary school. The main programs of study available at Sunway are in Business Administration, Communications, Computer Science, Natural Science, Engineering and Aviation although it is possible to transfer to other majors at WMU.


Xander owes part of his success to the lecturers. "They had a knack of helping us become more mature.

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The students in the top 10% were Caroline Villy (79), Chandra Fernandes (78), Jodhi Putra (77) and Liu Wei Wei (74). The top 25% were Alex (72), Sun Suishen (69), Kazi Tasneem (63), Edi Sudianto (62) and Randy Aliyanto (60).

The competition was open to students in the final year of secondary schools in Canada as well as international students in Canadian programmes. The aim of the competition is to provide students with an opportunity to develop their mathematical problem solving ability.

The students prepared for the competition by joining a math club in which they were given selected problems to solve once a week. The students had two and a half months to prepare. The competition itself was a 2.5 hour written test and took place on 17 April. Marks were given not only for answers but for expression of the answers.

Leon Varga, a math lecturer of the Sunway CIMP said "The Euclid Competition is aimed at top young mathematicians in the world as it requires not only knowledge but creativity to solve the often challenging questions". 
