

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
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

Sponsorships for aspiring Florence Nightingales



A collaboration between Sunway University College and a sister company, Sunway Medical Centre allows Sunway University College nursing students to be fully sponsored by Sunway Medical Centre to pursue a Diploma at Sunway University College and students to undergo clinical attachments with the five-star hospital as part of the course requirements.

The full sponsorship includes accommodation for the 3 year programme. In return, the students will be bonded to Sunway Medical centre upon qualifying. There are currently 29 nursing students at Sunway University College who are all sponsored.

Sunway University College assures the integrity and quality of nurses produced by them. The entry requirements set for the programme by the University are stringent and additional criteria have also been set by Sunway Medical Centre to be eligible for the sponsorship, which is for prospective students to have a minimum of a credit in biology.

Professor Jarlath Ronayne said, "Sunway University College's nursing course is small and limited to 30 per intake, allowing closer student-lecturer contact and more guidance for students in their studies. I am glad to say that the programme is approved by the Malaysian Qualifications Agency and the first intake we admitted was in July 2008"

Upon completing the final exams with Sunway University College, students will be eligible to sit for the Malaysian Nursing Board Registration Examination. Upon passing, the students qualify as registered nurses or staff nurses. After this they may specialise or pursue further studies to graduate and post-graduate levels.

Sunway opens Lancaster University Centre



A new Lancaster University Centre was officially opened by Professor Robert McKinlay, Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Lancaster University. Professor McKinlay was in Malaysia to represent his Chancellor, Sir Chris Bonington, at the first graduation ceremony in which graduates of the joint degree programme received their scrolls.

As part of its commitment to continuously provide quality education in Malaysia, Sunway opened this new centre within its premises to further strengthen the affiliation between itself and its British partner.

The partnership between Sunway University College and Lancaster University, which was formalised in 2006, has already seen Sunway develop their own undergraduate courses in Business, Psychology, Computing and Hospitality Management which are validated by Lancaster University, one of the top 20 universities in the UK and top 10 in research according to the Times UK Good University Guide 2009.

The partnership has resulted in world class degrees and is an excellent option for students who want a good UK degree with the "Malaysian experience". The BSc (Honours) in Accounting and Finance at Sunway University College, developed in collaboration with Lancaster University, is officially accredited by the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA) and is one of two Accounting and Finance degrees in Malaysia, to

be given provisional exemptions in 8 papers by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales (ICAEW).

"We are very pleased at Sunway that we passed all the 'tests' which Lancaster University set, to establish a lasting and effective partnership. Of prime importance was our ability to deliver honours degree programmes in collaboration with Lancaster which matched the high standards of this distinguished institution. The results achieved by our first graduates, in the Department of Psychology, 6 firsts class and 12 second uppers, justify the confidence that Lancaster has shown in us," said Professor Jarlath Ronayne. Vice-Chancellor of Sunway University College.

In 2009, the postgraduate courses offered through the School of Business and Law and School of Computing Technology pending accreditation from the Malaysian Qualifications Agency (MQA), will commence.

The Masters courses in Management, Management with Law as well as Money, Banking and Finance have been jointly developed by Sunway University College and the Lancaster University Management Schools (LUMS). LUMS is the 4th top business school in the UK and is the 22nd in the world according to the Financial Times Global MBA ranking for 2008. LUMS is also one of two UK management (business) schools acknowledged by the UK government as a six-star (6*) centre of world-class research in Management.

In addition to that, the School of Computing Technology will offer the Masters in Network and Mobile Systems and MSc in Computer Science (by research). Ranked one of the top 200 universities in the world by the authoritative THES-QS Guide to the World's Top 200 universities 2008, Lancaster University also ranks no 1 in the Northwest of England (which includes Manchester, Manchester Metropolitan and Liverpool) according to the Guardian and Independent League Tables UK 2008.

Sunway clinches 3 awards from Canadian council



Sunway University College made a milestone achievement recently when it clinched three awards in the Malaysia Canada Business Council (MCBC) Business Excellence Awards (BEA) 2008 including a surprise Canadian High Commissioner's Award.

Sunway took home the Gold Award for the Industry Excellence in Education category. It's second Gold Award came from the Good Corporate Citizen category. The third and most prestigious award received was the High Commissioner's Award, the only award given for significant contribution to Malaysian-Canadian bilateral relations directly resulting from the course of its daily business that reflects the spirit of the Malaysia Canada Business Council.

"It is with great pride that I received the awards on behalf of Sunway. These awards are a tribute to the fine work of each and every member of Sunway staff and students. I would like to specially thank all colleagues who have helped with the compilation and documentation of our achievements. I was told it was a close fight all the way to clinch these top awards" said Ms Elizabeth Lee, Executive Director of Sunway University College.

Sunway University College has been offering the Canadian International Matriculation programme since 1991 and is one of the largest providers of this Canadian Matriculation (Year 12) in the world. As a result of Sunway's continual success and growth in delivering this programme, and because Sunway attributes great value to expanding the provision of the Canadian curriculum in Malaysia, it established the first Canadian international school in Malaysia. Sunway International School, a private co-educational institution, was launched in October 2007 and admitted its first intake of Grades 10 and 11 in January this year.

Dr Anindita's book on democracy

Dr Anindita Dasgupta, a senior lecturer with the American Degree Transfer Programme at Sunway University College has been awarded the Asian Scholarship Fund (ASF) Collaborative Works Grant funded by the Ford Foundation and administered by the Asian Scholarship Foundation in Thailand.

Dr Anindita who teaches Pacific Asian Studies, will use the grant valued at USD16,000 to produce a landmark edited book titled 'Resurgent Democracies: Experiences of South and Southeast Asia'.


Seven scholars from around the world including Dr Maung Zarni from Oxford University, Dr Richard Whitecross from University of Edinburgh, Dr Stephen M. Lyon from Durham University, Professor Imtiaz Ahmed from Dhaka University and Neeta S Singh, a lecturer in Malaysian Studies at Sunway University College, were invited by Dr Anindita to write an 8,000-10,000 word chapter each for the book. Ms Neeta S. Singh will contribute a chapter entitled "Democracy: The Malaysian Enigma".

"There is little doubt that the restoration of democracy is imperative for the enjoyment of equal rights and liberties by the citizens of a country" said Dr Anindita. "The wave of popular movements or 'people power' demanding restoration of democracy that has swept across Asia in recent months provides the rationale for the selection of the seven case-studies for the book" she added.

The book will provide compelling chapters on democracy in Malaysia and six other Asian countries. The chapter on Malaysia will trace the development of democracy since independence and address whether people's power as seen in the March 2008 elections will lead to the return of true democratic principles. Dr Anindita emphasized "The contents of the book will reflect findings from new research and will be purely scholarly, without any political agenda and will provide a balanced and academic analysis of the recent burst of people-power across Asia". Dr Anindita added "More importantly, we hope that this book will be used as reference material for university students of political science and international relations as at the moment there is a lack of suitable books that cover this range of nations in South and Southeast Asia".

Dr Anindita was previously granted two other fellowships funded by the Ford Foundation and administered by the Asian Scholarship Foundation in Thailand in 2001 and 2003.

CIMP student is math wiz

Top-of-the-World feeling among A-Level students



The award included a prize money of AUD10,000 shared among the team members.



Grace and power in the pool


He surfs the net, hangs out with friends and watches movies in his spare time but that is where the similarity with 19-year old Melvin Chua Bao Quan, a student of Sunway's Monash University Foundation Year (MUFY) and other youngsters ends.

Melvin storms up the pool in squad training twice a day from 6.30 am to 9 am and from 4pm to 6.30 pm, clocking up about 6-7 kilometers each time. "That's about 240 laps a day" said Melvin. As most of us are studying our eyelids at 6.30 am, Melvin is psyching himself before he plunges into the icy pool at Bukit Jalil. He was training once a day before he joined the National squad and since 2006, two sessions a day is his normal routine. But Melvin thoroughly enjoys it. "When I win, it is all worthwhile" he said and added "I love the atmosphere at international meets which you won't find in Malaysia. The crowd is very appreciative. That rush keeps me going too"

From the time a tutor spotted him and encouraged him to take part in interschool swimming competitions, Melvin has represented Malaysia in the SUKMA Games in 2007 and 2008, SEA Games 2007 and FINA in 2006. His sport has brought him to Hong Kong, Australia, Japan, Thailand, Indonesia and Brazil and he has amassed around 39 gold medals.



This backstroke and medley specialist is well-focused on studies and swimming. He plans to pursue Psychology or a double degree in Biotechnology and Biomedicine. Most national swimmers in Malaysia retire after SPM to concentrate on studies but Melvin is still doing both. This exemplary student was given the Sunway University College Sports Scholarship and the Sunway University College Sportsman Award, all in 2008. He is tinkering with the idea of perhaps doing some part-time coaching in future.

What advice would he give to others who find life too challenging? "Always have a goal in mind. Mine is to make a mark in swimming including representing Malaysia in the Olympics in 2012. Having a goal to focus on just makes things easier when you go through rough times" said Melvin. He adds "In Malaysia, sport is not important enough but I hope things will change". As Melvin continues to pound the pool to meet the demands of his favourite sport, we wish him all the best.

Interview with Evan Cheah

Blaze spoke to alumnus Evan Cheah, General Manager of one of the companies in the Sunway Group and son of Tan Sri Dato' Seri Dr Jeffrey Cheah, Founder and Chairman of the Sunway Group and Founder and Chancellor of Sunway University College.

B: What year were you in Sunway College (then) and what programme did you read?

EC:I did the AUSMAT pre-university course before joining the Monash Sunway twinning programme in 1997. I then got a double degree in Commerce and Business Systems from Monash's Clayton campus in Australia.

B: What was it like studying in Sunway?

EC: Well, I hope to sound totally unbiased here! I think people make the institution and I felt it was a great experience interacting with the lecturers and students back then. Each lecturer holds his or her own unique style and I think that made things interesting. The on-campus facilities for a privately run institution were probably one of the Malaysia's best at the time and I think it still is.

I enjoyed my student life a lot because it was back then that I met many of my good friends. All one had to do was study and you could do well, it is different from the real world where there are many more variables to achieve success, and you can't really be 100% sure of the results of a particular project you're working on as there is much more complexity involved.

I think someone mentioned that in school, you just need to know all the material, score 100% and get a High Distinction. However, in business, you need to know all the material and more, scoring maybe 130% just to qualify for a Distinction!

B: What was your most memorable moment in Sunway College?

EC: I can't say there was one particularly memorable moment but there were happy memories throughout.

I remember I performed in a band for our Ausmat dinner once as the drummer (which was uncharacteristically cool of me). I set the pace of the performance and I kind of sped up because I was nervous, then the rest of the band had to speed up to catch up with me. It was like we were in chipmunk mode, which was funny. I also remember cramming for my exams (which I wouldn't suggest to anyone of course), but things always seemed to turn out well for me when I crammed because I think I have a reasonable capacity to remember things short term.

B: What did you pursue after you left Sunway College? EC: I did a double degree in Monash, as well as the CPA and CFA professional programs.

Next year I'll probably be looking at brushing up on my Mandarin Chinese as that will be an investment that will deliver returns to me for the rest of my life. Maybe much later on I may look at joining an executive education program at a business school to broaden my perspective of the world.

In addition to my formal education, I also read business books and magazines to expand my mind. There's a huge wealth of high quality knowledge out there of other people's thoughts and experiences and we can all make use of them to improve ourselves, I know I am. Doing anything when you have the right knowledge is just that much easier.

I often tell people that I strive to be a person that accumulates a "collection of best practices" where I persistently pick up practices from the best in a given field. Acquiring best practices also means cutting away any of the bad or dysfunctional habits that I may have unwittingly acquired through my life.

B: Describe your role now in your position as General Manager in the Sunway Group?

EC: It's really quite a challenging and exciting job where I evaluate and recommend investment proposals to management. This role lets me utilize many of the skills I've picked from the courses I've done.

I find with each proposal, whether we actually end up investing or not, I always learn something new which I can add to my repertoire of knowledge. Each time I meet with management, I consciously try to understand why this works and that doesn't, analyzing their experiences to improve my chances of making a better decision the next time.

A way I internalize these snippets of experience is by trying to reflect upon recent events and discussions as much as I can, as soon as I can.

Experience definitely counts and I try to make sure I constantly seek the views and advice of the people who have it (they're

usually older) to improve whatever I'm working on. In my view a person only knows as much as he has personally experienced but if we can have access to and apply the knowledge stored in others, we will have an unlimited amount of expertise at our disposal.

B: What are some of the challenges, if there are any you face in your job?

EC: Personally, when I try something new (be it recommending a new industry, business or structure), uncertainty and its best friend, worry, sometimes crop up but I deal with it by taking steps to make sure decisions or recommendations are based on the best information from most reliable sources I can find. Sufficient information removes some of the uncertainty and makes me more confident of my actions. When I'm uncertain, it just means I haven't looked hard enough for the decision making information I require.

B:. Has your father's remarkable achievements been an influence in your life? Could you elaborate on this?

EC:I would say he has had a good amount of influence in a lot of lives, not only mine. There are many things that he does that are not readily apparent and it takes a lot of observation and careful thought to understand it. I have had the privilege of having a closer view of the action and I think that has had a positive long-term impact on me and how I view things, both personally and work-wise.

B: What are your views on leadership? How can one strive towards becoming a leader?

EC: I would encourage people who want to be leaders to look deep into their core to understand what their own motivations are. The key is to find out what all this self-motivation talk is all about. Once that is answered, things become a lot easier. No one's going to help you to be a leader, you have to help yourself. There is no one-size-fits-all formula. It's got to be adapted to your own circumstances. Draw on your own strengths and interests. Be good in your field. Find your own way to manage human relationships as all leaders interact with people. In my opinion, the ability to manage human relationships to achieve a desired outcome is really the archetypal definition of being a good leader. Once we know ourselves, we know how what kind of leadership style we need to adopt.

I think in the end, leaders are noticed by delivering results, be it a community or business project. In school it's easy, just study hard you'll get the results. At the workplace or in society, it's more difficult as it's not just about studying (though it helps), it's more about getting everything in place, everyone working together, so that things get done. There are many ways of getting results and I would encourage reading about and observing how people have done it to customize a style that fits you.

B: What do you do in your free time?

Globalization means free time is a luxury. We are competing with the other brains from around the whole world. Slacken and you'll be overtaken. In this type of environment, we really have to focus on our comparative advantage as a Malaysian white-collar workforce. Constantly invest in improving ourselves. Once we are clear on that, we can rest a little. Personally, I do believe in a little work-life balance, in a recent article, the management guru Jim Collins mentioned that 50% of successful executives (I think he was referring to Fortune 500 CEO's if I remember correctly) have no life, the rest do have a life, and he concludes that it's really is a matter of choice. You can still deliver results if you work smart, and rest a little.

So in my free time I do get in some one on one time with American pop culture. You know, like movies, music and all that kind of stuff, it's enjoyable and keeps me happy.

B: What is your guiding motto in your life?


EC: Dare but do it wisely. Be circumspect. Contribute your strengths. Deliver high quality results. Understand trade-offs and the law of reciprocity. Think and plan a few steps ahead. Respect my own principles. Remember the past. Work smarter each time.

B:. What is important to you?

EC:I think we are all made up of cells that oxidize and age each day and we should take care of ourselves so that we can live the happiest life that we can. So health would probably be the first thing I would think of. With health, we will have to take care of people we care about and this includes family and friends.

Once that is in equilibrium, or a state that you are happy about, then comes achievements. If there is a lack of achievement, a person cannot be fulfilled or have any sense of belonging. Therefore, I believe I am driven by achievements as it gives me a sense of purpose. Without which, what's the point really?
