
Throughout this challenging learning environment, Sunway University continues to achieve greater heights as it propels the reputation of Malaysian education across the globe.

Help! Not another article about that deadly contagious virus that is to steal, kill and destroy my joy. The coronavirus has been quite the name above all names these days and not an hour has spared its trace of movement.

It has brought on a global pandemic and life does not seem normal at all. We found ourselves bowing to the standard operating procedures to save our lives but cannot help feeling that we have lost ourselves too.

The impact has cascaded to all livelihoods and for many students, a big part of the effect meant embracing the transition into online-oriented learning.

Almost overnight, the structures of group assignments, lectures and exams took a spin. Naturally, it takes time, strength, and perseverance for any student to adjust to the new normal of education from the mental, emotional and physical aspects.

For some, self-care can easily take a backseat in the pressing urgency to stabilise one's performance or to keep excelling in the scoresheets.

Under such circumstances, a couple of Sunway
University students shared how to ethically put self first
during the public health crisis. They remind us of what
we can say yes to for a battle we cannot say no to.

Being an extrovert, Fatima Hesham Abdo Al-Herwi was afraid of being cooped up at home. The lockdown was akin to imprisonment if she could describe it. "It was mentally and emotionally challenging not being able to socialise and meet new people or my friends," she said.


Video calls were made one green button after another, yet the digital platform could not possibly be the fulfilment for the social gap. Loneliness crept in and as days went by, stress and anxiety followed when Fatima remained in the walls of her apartment.

Thankfully, the young 20-year-old BIS (Hons) in Mobile Computing with Entrepreneurship student from Yemen decided that it was reflection time. "Eventually, I realised that doing something I love or enjoy would keep me sane," she said.

Cooking was one of her favourite activities. "I had time to learn some of my mom's recipes through video calling her." She also choreographed a better routine which includes setting herself for a proper sleep schedule.

"There will be times I struggle to get things done, but I would still say that I am satisfied with my current routine."

Her parents were also her backbone. "When I am down, I will always video call my parents and seek advice. My father usually says, 'If you need some time to breathe, stop whatever you're doing, think positively and do an activity you enjoy to regain strength.'"



Fizza Zaidi has a story of picking herself up too. If she had to choose one of the toughest adjustments as a student, it was the transition from physical classes to online learning.

"I struggled to get out of bed or attend classes online because of my lack of motivation. I felt the difference of online and physical classes, managing house chores and other things I had to adapt to during a pandemic," she said.

Her antidote was going through a list of things that she is thankful for every morning. "It might sound slightly cheesy but this positive attitude helps me keep my mental health in check," she said.

Acknowledging her privileges such as being financially secure, receiving an education and having good health has pushed her to strive forward and stay motivated. Not only that, but she could also have additional strength to ensure others around her are well and safe.

"I made a habit to call and catch up with my friends and family weekly. This reminds me to check up on others as it is easy to get caught up worrying about yourself. Life is easier when you know others are having similar issues," Fizza said.

The BA (Hons) in Communication, year-two, student born and raised in Dubai said having conversations about mental health and being vulnerable about difficulties in life was a game-changer.

"There is always someone out there who feels the same as you do. You just need to try to be open to difficult conversations to bring you closer to one another. Take this opportunity to build better relationships with new people and bond over the struggles of experiencing a pandemic."

She believes that being empathetic is key to helping each other to go the distance. A safe environment is one that is supportive and generous towards its citizens struggling with mental health.

"It is important to recognise that people of all ages, professions and backgrounds can experience mental health issues. Often, the focus does fall around students and our struggles with mental health, but lecturers and staff are experiencing it just as much."

Adding to that, Fizza thanked her supportive lecturers who themselves had adapted to this mega change and did everything they could to give students the best online learning experience.

"I am truly grateful towards the effort teachers put in above and beyond during this pandemic to make sure students have a positive experience. I admire them for they have motivated me to be a better student."

Self-care for Yee Kah Yan is to step away from the constant motion of her studies and responsibilities. "Rather than gluing myself onto the screens of my computer and my mobile device, I would try to do some sports to keep my mind active while having fun."

She had, in particular, grown an interest in skipping and had integrated various tricks and routines into it. Rest time meant to her that studies and responsibilities could not interfere then.

The pandemic is also an opportune time to be gracious about failures and imperfections. For Kah Yan, the practicality of it is to accept and recognise that failure is a part of life.

"Most of the time, our instinct to failures and imperfection is that we should be ashamed of them. But what we should remind ourselves is that failure is a fundamental element of our success."



The 22-year-old BSc (Hons) Business Studies student said that to remove the sting of fear towards failure is to confront it and look at the fruits of our labours. "Even though we may not have achieved the desired result, we should also look into the effort and dedication put into achieving the end goal."

She warned against being carried away by imperfections and falling into the pit of self-blaming ourselves. "We should all learn from the experience and realise that the gain from a failure is much more valuable than success," she said.

Professor Hew Gill, Sunway University's associate provost and a chartered psychologist, echoed the testimonials of these students to embrace change, establish a healthy routine and find a hobby in this season.

"Have you ever had the experience of being so interested in something that time seems to stand still, and when you next look at the clock, several hours have passed? This is being in 'flow' and it happens when we focus all our attention on something."

He said that hobbies do help with our mental and general health because it is mindfulness with purpose and fun.

"Find a hobby activity that you find completely absorbing, make it your hobby, and you will have hours of focused enjoyment. There's evidence that people who have hobbies and pastimes are happier and live longer."

Along with that, he said it is easy for students to treat sleep as though it is an inconvenience, but a discipline of getting the shut-eye time is essential.

"In normal times, we are all rushing here and there, so it's easy to stay up a little later or get up a little earlier without thinking about the impact on our sleep. Lockdown means we have nowhere to go and the opportunity to rebalance our sleeping pattern so we can get back into a healthy cycle."

Professor Hew also encouraged students to take control of the precious gift of time because it is the one thing that we cannot buy or get back. In aligning with the new world of work, he said students could appreciate being pioneers of users of amazing technologies in a cutting-edge era.

"Online is going to be a substantial part of the future. Organisations have discovered how easy it is to do business online, and the fact that it is also faster and much cheaper means it will become the new norm."

In foresight, the pandemic is the epitome of all bad things. But it's okay to not have felt okay, to have slipped in the first few steps of the uphill journey as you grow cosy to these new shoes. Take time to check in with yourself, to unwind and destress, while knowing that as you go through it, you grow through it.

The Wellness and Counselling team also provides outlets for students to access help consists of professionals available for mentoring and counselling. Taking care of your well-being is crucial for making your university experience an excitingly positive one. At Sunway University, we are committed to the mental health and wellbeing of all our students, and we want you to know that a range of support is available to you, should you need it.

# MALAYSIA'S GLOBAL TOP 1% RESEARCHERS BY CLARIVATE'S WEB OF SCIENCE

The School of Engineering and Technology Professor Mohamed Kheireddine Aroua and Professor Saidur Rahman were recently celebrated as Malaysia's Global Top 1% Researchers by Clarivate's Web of Science at a virtual award ceremony that feted 19 of the top researchers in Malaysia.

Clarivate powered by Web of Science identifies a list of Highly Cited Researchers annually who have demonstrated significant influence in their research field through the publication of multiple highly cited papers during the last decade.

In 2020, approximately 6,400 of the world's researchers were selected for this recognition in 21 research fields and across multiple fields. Of the world's population of scientists and social scientists, Highly Cited Researchers are one in 1,000. Their names were drawn from publications that rank in the top 1% by citations for field and year in the Web of Science citation index.

Associate Dean (Research and Postgraduate Studies) and Head of the Research Centre for Carbon Dioxide Capture and Utilisation, Professor Kheireddine earned his third recognition in a row by Clarivate's Web of Science. His research focuses on three challenges that mankind is facing which are the water security, energy security, and environmental and climate change.

"This is a very inspiring international award. It is a great recognition of my research output and impact in the field of my expertise," said Professor Kheireddine. His ultimate goal is to translate his research findings into practical solutions aim to mitigate the emissions of carbon dioxide which is the major contributor to global warming.

"This issue cannot be addressed by a singular individual, team or institution. Collaboration and partnership involving multiple research teams, universities and stakeholders is the key to tackle this task successfully," expressed Professor

Kheireddine to the challenge of solving the carbon dioxide problem.

Distinguished Research Professor and Head of the Research Centre for Nano-Materials and Energy Technology, Professor Saidur's expertise is in nano-materials, energy storage, heat transfer, energy policy and renewable energy. This is his seventh recognition in a row by Clarivate's Web of Science, realising his passion and dedication in his areas of research.

"It is an exciting moment and certainly drives me further towards high quality and impactful research," said Professor Saidur. Through his research, he intends to have an impact on academic, industrial, societal and environmental. Aside from producing high quality research publications in top ranking journals, Professor Saidur also educated postgraduate students who advanced their careers in top universities globally.

Professor Saidur's consistent achievement in his field of research did not stray him away from advancing his research for a better future. "Cost-effective, fast charging, longer duration, utility-scale energy storage would be my future research topic as these are grand challenges in my field," he added.

Devoted to their field of research, Professor Kheireddine and Professor Saidur also wish to address the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDGs) through their innovative ideas.

Sunway University is rapidly developing an ever-increasing reputation for its research activities that contribute to the economic and social development of the nation. These efforts are developing world-class researchers, supported by world-standard laboratories and international collaborations with some of the world's leading international universities, including joint research centres.



The Sunway University School of Engineering and Technology (SET) will introduce two inaugural Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) programmes in Electronic & Electrical Engineering and Chemical Engineering, in the upcoming intakes in August 2021 and March 2022, respectively.

Electrical engineering focuses on larger scale electrical equipment and machines as well electrical power generation, transmission and utilisation. In contrast, electronic engineering is largely associated with microminiature hi-tech semiconductor components, devices and systems along with their applications in areas such as embedded signal and data processing, computing and data processing, computer-based control, sensing and instrumentation, interfacing solutions, digital networks, radio, optical and mobile communications, among others.

Professor Serge Demidenko, Dean of the School of Engineering and Technology highlighted, "New laboratories with high-quality equipment were built to ensure students receive the best knowledge, exposure to new technologies, and skills training. Our school has assembled a team of highly capable academics with advanced professional qualifications, diverse international exposure, strong research portfolios, and extended successful education records to enhance students' learning experience. The SET team is led by Professor Dr.-Ing. Lau Sian Lun, Associate Dean (Engagement and Internationalisation) and Head of Department of Engineering who has in-depth knowledge of Malaysian and international engineering education landscape and possesses advanced professional qualifications and diverse experience in academia and research."

Recipients of the new Bachelor of Engineering degrees will be eligible to register as Graduate Engineers with the Board of Engineers Malaysia (BEM) and then to advance to Professional Engineer qualification upon gaining appropriate professional experience and meeting the requirements set by BEM. This Professional Engineer qualification is internationally recognised through the Washington Accord of the International Engineering Alliance – a global organisation that establishes and enforces internationally benchmarked standards for engineering education and expected competence for engineering practice.

# **A Postgraduate Conversion Degree**

Being at the frontier of a quality education provision, Sunway University has made it possible for many young hearts to follow their dreams with the recent launch of a postgraduate conversion degree. The University believes in lifelong learners not limited to Sunwayians but also any working adult. This also reflects the trend for young graduates to distinguish themselves in a competitive job market by adding a Master's degree to their CV.

A postgraduate conversion degree allows one to switch careers with specialist knowledge that an undergraduate degree has not prepared you for. It allows the student to acquire new knowledge within a shorter time, with intensive classroom learning and personal reflection. The most important aspect of the degree is it does not require prior knowledge or working experience on the subject matter. It brings a challenge to students to learn something new in every module in the programme. The curiosity of learning something new and moving towards a dream job has landed many students in the programme to obtain a job while studying. In addition, the degree provides flexibility for students to determine the track of learning, either an intensive pace of completion with a year or a longer duration of two years. The degree prepares the students to learn at their own pace rather than a rigid completion within a fixed period.

A postgraduate conversion degree has been a popular option for undergraduate students who initially signed up for a Bachelor's degree based on their strength and interest and not so much about having a career in mind. Postgraduate conversion degrees offer another chance to follow their passion into a dream job. Besides the assistance of changing the career path, there are other benefits of pursuing a postgraduate conversion degree, such as:

- The global pandemic has shocked many students who are now left to ponder
  their diminishing career prospects. According to the Department of Statistics, the
  unemployment rate in August 2020 was 4.7%, the number of unemployed persons
  amounting to nearly three-quarters of a million people. The Department also
  confirmed a higher unemployment rate for the youth in comparison to all adults.
  The results of the statistics open doors for young students who want to upskill
  across various disciplines.
- Most postgraduate programmes were designed to recruit students to advance
  their knowledge in their chosen discipline. Very few postgraduate programmes
  offer the opportunity for students to switch to other areas. Sunway bridges
  this gap by offering a Conversion Master's programme for students who have
  completed any Bachelor's degree to join the programme.
- The Department of Statistics also revealed in April a dip in undergraduate salaries, from RM2,500 in 2019 to RM1,500 in 2020, due to the pandemic effect on the Malaysian employment market. The conversion degree helps uplifts the student to a higher salary whereby Masters graduates were reported still earning in the range of RM5,000 to RM10,000.

# A Postgraduate Conversion Degree at Sunway University - Master of Marketing

Sunway University offers a postgraduate conversion degree in collaboration with Lancaster University for individuals to explore the possibilities. This is in line with the University's mission to nurture all-around individuals and devote themselves to the discovery, advancement, transmission, and application of knowledge that meets the needs of our society and the global community. The conversion degree not only upscales the qualifications of the Sunwayians but also opens doors for new ventures for those who wish to pursue. If you could dream up your birthday cake, what would it look like? A bucket of fried chicken? Your favourite shoe brand? Or maybe tacos – because why go for the dull old round or square cake? But wait! You don't have to dream. You just need to check out Karmen's Cupcakery.

Karmen-Ann Mariswamy, BSc (Hons) in Culinary Management alumna, started her business selling simple cakes and cupcakes. What began as a time filler while being at home to tend to family emergencies and looking for a new job eventually grew into something more as orders kept coming in.

With the power of social media and word-of-mouth, Karmen-Ann lets her cakes do the talking to rake in the business business, right from when her family brought her cakes to social events such as birthdays and office parties. Her cake masterpieces were the selling point as orders rippled in from her family's friends and colleagues. And her business was boosted when her Kentucky Fried Chicken (KFC) cake got featured by

When COVID-19 hit, cancellations were plentiful especially during the first month of lockdown. However, business picked up soon after as deliveries became a norm for people to send gifts, and cakes are great pick-me-ups or to celebrate occasions at home. In March 2021 alone, she produced 24 cakes.

an online news portal.

What makes her cakes special are the personal customisations. Customers can request or provide inspiration of a specific item or idea for the cake and Karmen would bounce back ideas to fulfil their requests. She has even made a curry noodle cake with floating chopsticks before.

"Sometimes while scrolling through Pinterest or Instagram, I find a design and think 'Oh, I know just who would love this cake!'"

Custom cake designing is not always a piece of cake for her. Karmen once had to turn down a request for a cake in the shape of a burger but with all the ingredients healthy. She also shared her most challenging design - a simple two-tiered buttercream cake for a 21st birthday party. The customer wanted a specific colour and a specific design with the buttercream which she could not replicate. She eventually figured it out and was worried if the customer would like the cake. In the end, she got a phone call immediately after she sent a picture of the finished product. It was the customer screaming with joy as she loved the cake.





Pastry and cake designing was initially not in her career plans. In fact, she hated art as a kid and almost failed her pastry class in college. Her interest sparked when she helped her older sister decorate cakes – her sister also used to sell custom made fondant cakes. Her interest then peaked through a cake decorating module in Sunway. The course provided her with the basic skills which she has relied on. She started enjoying it through her diploma internship at The Westin Kuala Lumpur where she received an offer to work in the pastry department.

"Once, when I was 15, I had an art teacher told me that a seven-year-old could paint better than me. I would love for her to see my work now."

Finding happiness in what you do makes a world of difference. Work becomes more than clocking in and out of the office and receiving your salary. When asked about her future plans, Karmen shared that she was happy as she is. She can't go more than two days without baking or decorating a cake and she will want to get back to her cake room and just make something. She is happiest when she is working alone in her baking room with her favourite TV show playing in the background.



Continuing with more words of advice from Karmen, she shares that patience and confidence is important should one decide to be a baker or cake designer. A lot of time and effort is needed to build the skills which will then convert into confidence in yourself. Patience is especially important in cake decorating because it takes time for a design to make sense and come together - the more you rush a cake order, the messier the cake becomes.
