





We were a bit skeptical of our chances this time because there were many teams with the fervour and capability to claim the coveted crown.





People that are willing to work for one another, that can cover for another player's weakness.


The team functioned well together and gelled easily because we all had a common goal, that is, to win. And that pushed us forward.







Lives Like Autumn Leaves ? Elizabeth Lee's Take

To lose a loved one can prove to be very painful, and this is something Elizabeth Lee, Sun-U's Executive Director, has continuously seen and come to understand over the years. Corresponding through email, she shares her feelings and rationale over the fragile lives of our youth.

1. What do you think about the subject on the fragile lives of the youth? Do you see it as a waste of potential and effort? Is it not agonizing for loved ones?

To me, you are all at the cusp of life. For years your parents have nurtured you, and we, as your surrogate parents at the University, try hard to put in the last finishing touches to prepare you to embrace the exciting life ahead. To be killed as you take your maiden flight is just unbearable to those of us who see our primary role as preparing you for this very mission.

I get angry. Yes, I get angry that my students spend their God-given lives by living dangerously and that, in a couple of cases, they chose to end it prematurely for reasons which were just never important enough to warrant such fatal decisions—and that is when I feel helpless and agonise over why we had never seen it coming and could not prevent such a tragic action.

2. How has the loss of our students affected you? After so many years, is it still a painful experience to go through?

When I lost my first student to a horrendous accident, I just burst into uncontrollable tears upon receiving the news. She was a young Monash student, whose life had been ripped from her as she was driving to class.

I have lost far too many students over the years (and this year has robbed us of an unacceptable number of lives from amongst our young

charges). It doesn't get any easier with each announcement of death.

Most of the time, I have not had the privilege of having known them personally while they were still alive with us and it has become a case where I've gotten to know the student at death. I feel cheated.

But it is a consolation that I get to know the family; and some of the parents and I have

become close, bonded by the fact we have lost a child between us.




I was actually a lot braver than I am now! My older colleagues remember me as a 'hell driver', impatient to get to our point of destination in the shortest time. I had no qualms about camping out in the open and considered the ultimate thrill to be jumping out of an airplane and free-falling before landing with the aid of a parachute.

But that feeling of thrill diminished as years progressed and I hope that my daughters have not inherited such yearnings from me as I would hate for them to sky-dive and hang-glide. I agree with my mother now that these activities are certainly much too dangerous indulgences.

4. Why do you think we, us youths, are sometimes so careless with our lives and the risks we take? Do you think that it's because we view ourselves as indispensable?

I guess it's the sense of adventure and wonder which comes with new-found independence. The risk-taking is good preparation for real life and it does augur



well for each young person.

But like all things, it's the balance we need to have. We need to have a grounded grip of reality and assess the actual risk so that we do land on our feet safely when we take that jump out of the plane and sky-dive.

I don't think young people feel that they are indispensable, but, rather, that they still have to take risks in order to grow, just as they took their first steps twenty years or so ago as toddlers...

Moving stairways à la Hogwarts



No matter how great a time you are having boarding, there is one factor that will determine your boarding experience; your roommate. Your roommate can either be your best friend or your worst nightmare and bear in mind that you will be spending the next year or so sharing your living space with this person.If you have a bad roommate(a.k.a one who smokes, breaks hostel rules, has bad/unsettling behaviour,etc.),ECHO recommends that you SWITCH ROOMMATES IMMEDIATELY. To do this, one applies for different lodgings with the Hostel Management floor of the condominiums and the together with a complaint about your current roommate.

Of course, it is not enough to just keep a good relationship with your roommate.Once one has established a good relationship, we recommend exploring the hostel. It is always a great idea to know thy neighbours, especially when there are several dozen of them. Always keep in mind an open attitude when meeting your neighbours, as their personalities can be varied. ECHO recommends that you do this with your roommate, several of your friends, or someone already staying at the hostel. This makes the experience less

daunting and a lot more fun. One can learn many new things from these "hostel-mates", from roller-blading to cooking. And, of course, have a lot of fun along the way.

The next step to a great boarding experience is to KEEP YOUR ROOM CLEAN. Yes, all those quotes and anecdotes on how a clean environment makes you feel better are true. Although the hostel does provide cleaning services once a week, we recommend that you do some additional cleaning yourself.Buy some basic cleaning tools like a broom, a mop, and the all-important damp cloth(for wiping dusty surfaces), which one can buy almost anywhere. We recommend a light cleaning once or twice a week, or right after holidays. Obviously, don't devote too much of your time to this; there are many things one can do besides this. As for your clothes, there is always the launderette on the ground launderette just outside the back entrance of Sunway College.

Your next concern would be food. You would may not be keen on cooking your own food, especially as it is disallowed in the hostel, so we strongly recommend eating out. The best places to go in our books are Medan Food Court, the ubiquitous restaurants known to us only as Pink and Orange, and the local 'mamak' stall, Jafaar, all within a 10-minute walk from the condominiums. These eateries serve great food for a good price. Of course, if one desires something else besides the above options, there is always the Pyramid, which is a 15-minute walk via the back

drive by taxi (RM5).

To survive in the hostel, financial support is essential. Always ensure you have enough funds to carry you through the month.ECHO recommends that you do not splurge your entire monthly allowance too early for obvious reasons, as hard as this may be for many. One way to do this is to ration your funds by setting a weekly quota. And of course, always put aside a bit for a rainy day(a.k.a something really interesting you saw in the Pyramid or to pay for an extra dinner)

Finally, even if you have established all of the above, life for a student staying at the hostel one can become boring very quickly. Fortunately for you, there are many things one can do to pass the time besides studying. One way to pass the time is to go to Sunway Pyramid Shopping Centre. From archery to bowling to arcades, this place seriously has everything. And oh yes, plenty of designer clothing shops. Also another way to pass the time is the Cybercafe above Medan Food Court, which is a great place to socialise by shooting your friends down in a friendly game of Counter-Strike. Even better, buy a form of home entertainment. Even something as mundane as a novel can be exciting after several hours of studying.

Of course, all of the above are merely guidelines; how you choose to live your boarding life is entirely up to you. All we can really assure of, though, is a new experience. And plenty of house-cleaning.

> I mean, why pay more for something that may be of lesser value or functionality when you can get a better version for half the price? So, as tedious as it may be, price comparison is actually a habit we should pick up.





2. HELLBOY II: THE GOLDEN ARMY












7. SAW V




10. MIRACLE AT ST. ANNA








The Olympics: To Tech or Not to Tech?


6. What would a 'guy' pet (animal) be?






10. Why do girls view shopping as recreational whereas guys view shopping as a necessity?




02. GAMING CONSOLES

04. CARS



This dish is Chinese in origin, and was brought over by Hainanese immigrants to Malaya (now known as Malaysia) when they settled here.

Well, if you're jumping at the chance to have some check out, our (Agents Lyn, Nic and Win's) search for great chicken rice (better known here locally as 'kai fan')

Lim Kee Chicken Rice

Address and landmarks: Kedai Kopi DU, No. 2, Jalan SS 21/58, Damansara Utama, 47400 Petaling Jaya, Selangor (corner lot, in the DU Uptown district, opposite Alliance Bank and on the same row as Baskin Robbins and Puzzini).

What we ordered:

Steamed chicken rice + soup: RM 4.50 Roasted chicken rice + soup: RM 4.00

Resting in a river of sauce which was neither too thick nor diluted, the chicken meat was tender, with the skin of the roasted chicken slices not burnt even at the wing joint. The cucumbers, though fresh were a bit too thickly sliced for Agent Lyn's liking The small bowls of soup were just okay; though not particularly tasty. On the other hand, the rice itself was fragrant and good, and the chilli sauce was tinged with plenty of lime and garlic.

- Hainanese chicken rice is considered as one of the national dishes of Singapore, and probably one of Malaysia's too.

SIMPLY MALAYSIAN

So you've stepped off the plane into sunny (and sometimes rainy) Malaysia, setting foot in our beloved Sunway campus, and besides getting used to the weather, food, culture and your course syllabus, you have no idea what your roommate is saying (okay, maybe not 'no idea'but you still don't really get what he/ she's talking about) Talk about argh. We at ECHO sympathise, and provide you with this handy, brief guide to Malaysian-shpeak.

"Fuyoh." ['foo-yeoh']

This term is used by one of Malaysia's leading mobile phone service providers, Digi, as their tagline. Has the same meaning as the words 'wow' and 'whoa'; used as a release or expression of emotion when something particularly 'wow-worthy' happens.

Example: "Fuyoh. So much ar? Can you really eat all that?"

"...wan/one." [pronounced the same way as the number one]

Usually used at the end of a sentence, as an emphasis to what was said earlier.

Example: "He's like that wan. Gives a lot of homework, and expects you to pass up tomorrow...get used to it."

Mat salleh/ang mor

['maat sahl-leh/ahng more']

Two non-derogatory terms used to describe Caucasian foreigners land actually, non-foreigners as well]. The second term is part of the Hokkien [Chinese] dialect.

Examples: "Isn't your father a 'mat salleh'? Not bad, he can eat super hot curry also...""Fuyoh, that 'ang mor' ... she's so tall!"

Outstation [pronounced how it looks]

The phrase 'outstation' refers to people who are still in the same country, but in a different state than the one they're usually in (eq. one who lives in Selangor, but has to go to Terengganu for a business meeting for a couple of days).

Example: "Where is your father? Outstation?"

"Haiyo." ['ha-eye-yeoh']

the beginning of a sentence. Has the same value as the chat term '*sigh*', and is used...well, ever heard of the Japanese sweatdrop? This is kind of the Malaysian equivalent. It is also used to express feelings of exasperation.

Example: "Haiyo, give your project partners some work lah! Don't try to do Example: "That actress very everything."

"Can wan/one!" [pronounced how it looks]

Has the same meaning as 'it can be done'.

Example: "Don't worry, surely can do wan!"

"Like that ar? Like that ar." [like that 'arh']

The first phrase generally means 'is thatso?' or 'is it done like this?', while the second one is an expression of 'oh, so that's how it's done' or the more subtle 'oh'. The term 'ar' is merely a suffix, giving slight emphasis ['wan/one' is heavier] to previously spoken words. The Malaysian slang equivalent

Example of usage of 'ar': refer to example of 'fuyoh', please!

Dong/blur ['dhong']

A non-derogatory term that refers to someone who is confused, slow on the uptake, distracted, or has so much on his/her mind that he/she cannot grasp what is being said.

Example: "Why you so blur today? Don't be like that guy, he's very 'dong' wan."

Rojak ['roh-jark']

Has two meanings. One refers to a Malaysian dish, which consists of a jumble of vegetables or fruits, covered in sauce. The other a Malaysian slang phrase meaning 'mixture/a jumble of sorts', and usually refers to how Malaysians speak English with Malay, Chinese and Indian phrases added here and there - draws a parallel with the actual dish, no?

Example: "Make sure you don't Another expression of emotion; used at 'rojak' all over the place in your speech!"

> Leng chai/leng lui ['lehng chai/looi']

A phrase of Cantonese [Chinese] origin, which basically means 'handsome guy/pretty girl', or refers to someone who is hot.

'leng lui' lah."

Mamak ['mah-markh']

Refers to Indian-Muslim restaurants which serve 'roti canai', 'teh tarik', and 'nasi kandar' (go to one to find out more about these dishes, but be prepared for spicy food!), which are more often than not open-air and show football games - a common hang-out of sorts for most Malaysian youths.

Example: "Hey, let's go 'mamak'!"

"But then right/but then ar..." [pronounced how it looks]

of 'however' or 'then again'.

Example: "He seems like a nice person...but then ar, you never know...

Belanja ['ber-lahn-jar']

Something like 'my treat'. Example: "Come on, let's go for drinks together. I 'belanja' you lah!"

Used in restaurants, when one wants some food packaged for take-away, or when one cannot finish the order and wants to bring the leftovers home/doggie bag.

Example: "Aunty, can you 'bungkus' this chicken rice for me? I'm 'ta pau'ing it for a friend."

Lepak ['leh-park']

A phrase meaning 'hang out'.

Example: "Hey, you free after class? Let's go 'lepak' at Pyramid!"

Action [pronounced how it looks]

Refers to someone who is proud or stuck-up.

Example: "Sorry to say, but your boyfriend very action lah..."

Teman ['teh-marn']

As a verb, it basically means 'accompany'. Of Malay origin.

Example: "Can you 'teman' me to the bookshop for a while? Need to get a pen.

"Choi!"

Ta pau/bungkus ['tah-pauh/buhn-khus'] Syok sendiri/LOA ['shiok sen-dee-ree']

Refers to actions made by a person who puts himself/herself in the spotlight for no apparent reason; hence the acronym LOA, which stands for 'lack of attention'.

Example: "Haiyo, stop being so 'syok sendiri' - dancing in the foyer like a chicken, of all things! So LOA."

"Mad ah/ar?" [pronounced how it looks]

The Malaysian counterpart of 'are you crazy?', or 'have you gone mad?'.


Example: "Mad ar? Why are you driving so fast for?"

So there you have it, a brief guide to interpreting Malaysian-English (or Manglish). Hope this comes in handy!



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
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
